Course Information

Course Description and Objectives

This course is designed to provide beginners (without prior knowledge of Italian) with a variety of tools aimed at developing their communicative competence in the four major language skills: listening, reading, speaking, and writing, as well as to acquire familiarity with Italy and Italian culture.

We cover **UNITÀ 1-3**. Each unit comprises two lessons: **Lezioni A and B**. They are thematically organized and structured so to provide ample opportunity to practice the target language, equally supporting language comprehension and production.

It is my hope all students, regardless of grade earned, end the course with a better understanding of the Italian language, a deepened awareness of the Italian Culture and its people, and a renewed desire to continue Italian.

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We will communicate in the target language as much as possible using all resources available to us such as e-mail, *CANVAS* Course Site and the Supersite (textbook website). Make sure to register with the same valid BC email account. I may post on CANVAS Course Site material & links related to Italy & Italian language & culture you may enjoy and find helpful. If you like, feel free to share interesting and useful sites and pics for all to enjoy.

There are no pre-requisites for this course. If you are joining the course with prior knowledge (formal or informal of Italian), please consult with your instructor to determine if this course is suitable or a more appropriate level is advised. The determination is made on a case-per-case basis based on student's overall prior experience and exposure as well as retention and time elapsed since last experience with the language.

The course will offer ample opportunity to practice the target language and more resources may be provided by your instructor and posted on *CANVAS*. You are encouraged to use Italian regardless of lexical and grammatical accuracy. Remember, "Practice makes perfect!" All students in the class have enrolled to learn Italian, use it and encourage the timid classmates to do the same. It is the only way (aside from total immersion in the country where the target language is spoken) to improve oral comprehension and sharpen your speaking and writing skill aiming to a more accurate oral expression. Do not compare your progress to other in the class.

Students will practice all four language skills: <u>listening</u>, <u>speaking</u>, <u>writing</u>, and <u>reading</u> while incorporating <u>culture</u>, a pivotal and integral part of foreign language learning. Awakening interest and furthering the understanding of Italian culture is essential while studying the language to understand people and customs. Keep an open-mind and embrace the differences as well as the similarities with your own culture. You may travel to Italy in the near future.

This course exposes students to a communicative approach to language acquisition with high frequency vocabulary words and grammatical patterns used as tools for improving language comprehension and production.

It is my hope all students, regardless of grade earned, will end the course with a renewed appreciation and understanding of the language, an increased awareness of its Culture, and a desire to continuing learning Italian.

Course Requirements and Grade Distribution

Attendance on time and **participation** in Italian are expected to learn and make progress in the language, which will facilitate your instructor's fair and accurate assessment of your performance in the course. You are allowed 3 absences w/o penalizing your participation portion of the grade. Be considerate of others if you are collaborating on a project¹. Note: Everyone will begin w/ 100% on the participation portion of the grade. Beginning w/ the fourth absence, five points are deducted for every absence. Attenzione! 3 tardies = 1 absence! 15%

*** Regarding Absences due to Religious Observance: The Arts & Humanities Division of Bellevue College, committed to advancing pluralism, recognizes its students' diverse religious beliefs. Those students who wish to observe a religious holy day should not be penalized for doing so. Whenever feasible, students should be allowed to make up academic assignments that are missed due to such absences. However, the student must notify the instructor in writing at the beginning of the quarter (no later than the end of week 2). Because religious holidays are scheduled in advance, instructors have the right to insist that course work be completed prior to an anticipated absence for religious observances.

Tests (Prove) are <u>at the conclusion of each Lezione A and B</u>. <u>The lowest test grade will be dropped</u> (engrade - our online grade book - indentifies automatically the lowest test grade by an asterisk).

No make-up tests are allowed except for extenuating circumstances such as death in the family, hospitalization, illness, sole person caring for an ill family member, or for any BC sponsored event. Arrangements can be made for

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a make-up test at the discretion of the instructor and ONLY if the student requests the make-up test no later than two days after the test has been administered. If you fail to contact me, I will assume you chose to take a zero and consider the test missed your lowest score to be dropped. 20%

WebSAM activities (Compiti = assignments) are completed online on the <u>Supersite</u> and rarely from handouts or directly assigned from the textbook. PRATICA activities are assigned daily and due date visible on the <u>Supersite</u> as we advance through the various color-coded sections of each Lesson within the Unit. You are responsible to complete the *pratica activities* prior to coming to class or as soon as possible if circumstances prevented you from doing so. <u>Daily PRATICA activities are not graded</u> and only receive the computer generated word "credit" in <u>blue</u> when completed on time or "credit" in <u>red</u> when late; either way, they are for "practice" and will not impact your grade for the course but may negatively impact your daily participation as you will feel unprepared to respond. It is solely your responsibility to stay on-track with material covered. <u>All activities are due at 11:59pmPT</u>. <u>WEBSAM</u> <u>activities include what has been assigned from Workbook, Lab and Video Manuals. They are due at the end of each Lezione (A and B) the day of the TEST or PROVA by 11:59pm. WEBSAM activities are graded at the end of conclusion of the entire Unità, in other words, you will receive a single grade for each WEBSAM Unit (A+B). Grades are generated by <u>Supersite</u> based on completed activities and accuracy. I usually assign from 30 to 50 activities per UNITÀ but it may vary per lesson. Activities requiring instructor input and manual checking are listed as <u>pending</u> until grading is completed. **20**%</u>

AVVERTENZA ABSTAIN from ASKING ME TO ACCEPT LATE ACTIVITIES. It develops poor habits, rewards poor behavior, imposes on my time, and last but not least, it is unfair to other classmates. <u>Supersite takes off 10%</u> for each day an activity is completed past the due date. It is clearly indicated on the site of each activity itself if late.

Oral presentations will consist of one group project and one solo project or interview. Instructions and further details announced on *My*BC and Supersite as the date approaches. **20%**

Final exam (esame: scritto e orale) is comprehensive. It includes material from the all UNITÀ covered during the quarter. All language skills are assessed: 1) Listening comprehension: Authentic audio will be played, followed by post-listening oral comprehension activity. 2) Writing: Vocabulary and grammatical structures covered (Contesti & Strutture) are assessed in a variety of exercise formats of increasing difficulty, including a short essay. 3) Reading comprehension: You will read an ad or article whose content is new yet familiar as it relates to any the themes covered in the four UNITÀ followed by reading comprehension questions or statements. 4) Culture: You will be assessed on your cultural competency based on the content presented in the UNITÀ (Cultura, Panorama, Lo Zapping). 5) Speaking: It is assessed during the oral presentations (see above). Instructions are posted on MyBC as time approaches. Topic of discussion/conversation may come from all UNITÀ covered. 25%
