Course Description:

ASL 222 is an advanced American Sign Language course and is designed to complement course work in ASL. This advanced course will enable you to increase your vocabulary, conversational skills, introduce you to translating written text.

Course Objective:

At the completion of the course, students should be able to demonstrate advanced receptive and expressive competence in ASL. Communicative activities and topics include but are not limited to during the course:

*Understand each unit: Level II: 16, 17 Level III: 18, 19, 20, 21

*Understand the grammatical and syntax principles in ASL: Describing & Identifying Things, Talking About the Weekend, Narrating Unforgettable Moments, Sharing Interesting Facts, Explaining Rules, Telling About Accidents

*Understand the current issues concerning deaf culture and community

*Understand deaf history

Course Policy:

Attendance: Your attendance is required if you are to succeed in any language class.



ASL 222 is no exception. Because the language is visual and manual, your eyes, body and mind must be present or you cannot learn. Your participation in class activities is a *required* part of your attendance. American Sign Language is all about communication and communication is the interaction between individuals sharing information. A book or videotape can never provide this communication environment. If for any reason you miss a class, it is your responsibility to contact a classmate and find out what was missed. If you missed a handout it is your responsibility to make a copy of that handout from a fellow student or to contact the instructor for a copy. Make-ups are not possible for missed

Your attendance will be recorded by your name and signature on the tests or quizzes. Attendance sheet at the beginning of class. You will be counted present with your signature AND if you are present for the entire class period. Your percentage of attendance will be factored into your final grade and will earn you part of your Participation percentage. Showing up late and leaving early are disruptive to the class. Please be on time! You will be allowed to use your free passes, if needed. If you will miss more than one class due to any medical reason, please bring a doctor's note.

Exams:

There will be two exams this quarter. Each exam will cover three units and have three parts. 1. receptive: to test your ability to read and understand signs 2. expressive: to test your ability to produce and use signs and grammatical concepts 3. written: to test your ability to recall assigned readings and discussions in class. For the receptive part, I will sign and fingerspell. For the expressive part, you will choose a partner in whom you both will develop a conversation based on the units you are being tested on and guidelines, which the instructor will pass out. The conversation should be between 3-4 minutes. I will let the class know the exam dates in advance.

Quizzes:

Throughout the guarter, you will be guizzed on each unit. Specific dates will be announced in class.

Workshop WED:

Every Wednesday is Workshop Wednesday. I will post something for you to translate into ASL. You will do it at home alone, then on Wednesdays work in groups to refine. Each week someone different from each group will sign the translation to the class.

Deaf School Project:

This is a group project. Each group will choose a deaf school in the United States to present to class. The group will "market" the school. The presentation should be at least 20 minutes. Be creative and use visual aids/props.

Deaf VLOG Project:

Choose an active video blog (VLOG) that is updated frequently. You may choose more than one if you cannot find one that is updated regularly. Let me know at the beginning which you have chosen and send me a link to it. You will follow this for at least 10 to 20 postings. You will then write a paper. Directions will be handed out in class or posted to the class website.

Your Choice Project: Book Report/Film Report/ Song Translation Video:

You have the option of reading a book/novel that is Deaf/ASL related **OR** watch a total of 3 films (1.5- 2 hours minimum), **OR** translate a song of your choice. Type a report reviewing the book/movies you have chosen.

NOTE: Once you have chosen your book, 3 movies or song video, submit to your instructor for approval.

Cultural Contact Paper: A Cultural Endeavor!

Practical application of your sign language skills is required <u>this quarter</u>. You are required to have a minimum of **4 contacts** totaling **8 hours of Deaf/ASL contact** this quarter to provide you first-hand experience with American Deaf culture, and hopefully to introduce you to new friends. These contacts are designed to build your confidence in your ability. You will keep a journal of these experiences, and write a brief reaction/reflection paper analyzing your contact experience. It is due at the end of the quarter and is worth 100 points. You will find the requirements and guidelines for this assignment on **CANVAS**.

I strongly encourage classmates to get together and practice outside of class to maintain signing skills. Look for ways to keep your hands moving every day! Trust me! You will appreciate what it does for you! If you have any concerns or are in need of help please feel free to see me. I am here to help each of you.
