# Course Information

# **Course Outcomes**

- Students will learn how to become a cohesive jazz ensemble unit, learning how to efficiently listen, interact, accompany and even lead alongside each other.
- Familiarity and understanding of many of the sub-genres of the jazz idiom (bebop, blues, post-bop, funk, modern jazz, bossa, etc.)
- Each ensemble will put together a full, memorized set of prepared tunes in order to perform in front of a live audience.
- Students will learn critical thinking in the ensemble setting. In other words, emphasis will be placed on each musician to learn and understand the inner workings that make a group excellent.
- Students will learn how to better and more efficiently practice their own instruments and acquire new musical concepts.

# How Outcomes will be met

The course outcomes will be met by:

- · Attending regular lectures and rehearsals
- Critical listening activities
- One-on-one instruction
- Regular work and practice outside of class

### Grading

As this is a group performance class, it is IMPERITIVE for each member to show up to <u>each and every rehearsal possible</u>. As such, attendance will account for the **bulk** of each student's grade. If absences are required, the student must warn the instructor, as well as the ensemble, ahead of time. In addition to showing up to each rehearsal and lecture, each member is expected to learn his or her assigned, individual parts to a level of excellence and to actively participate in the ensemble. Repeated failures to make individual progress will result in a lowered grade reasonably chosen by the instructor.

### **Books and Materials Required**

No books are required, but personal "fakebooks" are encouraged to own. Each member is expected to own or have frequent access to whatever instrument(s) he or she chooses to play in the ensemble. Required musical materials will be handed out.

A good group balances pressure and fun. Therefore, though pressure is needed to achieve the set goal of having a great ensemble, having fun and enjoying the music is the ultimate goal. I also expect each member to respect their peers' levels of musicianship. We are all on different levels in our musical journey, and I will ONLY accept encouragement and NOT discouragement.
