

#### All Gender Restrooms

Please find the map of all gender restrooms on the back cover of this program. On Saturday, the restrooms closest to the cafeteria will also be designated All Gender. If ever you don't feel comfortable, please look for folks wearing "I Will Go With You" buttons.

#### **Allies**

We do ask that allies give space to the LGBTQ participants of Power of One. We are not asking you to be silent, but rather we are asking that you be mindful of honoring the voices and experiences of those who are in the LGBTQ community. Do not tell us how to think, feel, act.

#### Classes

Bellevue College classes are in session on Friday, April 21. We ask that you be respectful and quiet when moving between conference sessions.

## **Consent for Physical Interaction**

Consent should not be assumed. Each of us is responsible for making sure we have consent in every social and sexual situation. If you are unsure about touching (hugging, handshakes, etc) or intercourse, you must determine how the other person feels before initiating the social or sexual activity.

## Counseling

We will have an on-call counselor throughout the event, as well as an on-site counselor during the HIV Testing on Friday. On Saturday, we will have a counselor available by phone from 10:00 am–5:00 pm at 425-229-5100.

## **Late Night Shuttles**

The Embassy Suites has graciously agreed to have a 10:00 pm shuttle run from the back of the C building to their front door. Bellevue College will have a shuttle running at 10:00 pm to the Hyatt House and the Silver Cloud. These two hotels are walkable, so we ask that this shuttle be reserved for people who have mobility issues. Please do not walk alone during the conference, but rather walk in groups.

## **CEO of Grist/Former Washington State Representative Brady Piñero Walkinshaw**

Brady Piñero Walkinshaw brings years of experience working in the state on issues of environmental stewardship, fair wages, shared economic growth, and social justice. In 2013, Brady was appointed to represent the 43rd district in the Washington State House, a district which encompasses much of central Seattle.

A lifelong Washingtonian, Brady's mother and her family immigrated to the United States from Cuba, while his father's family traces back for generations in Washington State. Both parents inspired an ethic of hard work and compassion for those in need. He lives on Capitol Hill with his husband, Micah Horwith, a Seattle native and a marine biologist with the State's Department of Natural Resources.

Piñero Walkinshaw will be addressing the difficulty of working across constituencies, and how that work is imperative for social change.



## **Comedians/Writers Julie Goldman & Brandy Howard**

Julie & Brandy are writing partners who have been writing and hosting together since 2007. They have worked as staff writers for TV Shows (Including Fashion Police on E! and Funny Girls on Oxygen) and together they have written 2 feature length screenplays and 3 half-hour comedies (including their latest script, Pushing It). Guests of many a podcast, the ladies have recently started their own podcast, Dumb, Gay Politics, now available on iTunes.

Goldman is a stand-up comedian with a rather large and dedicated following. She was a series regular on Logo's Big Gay Sketch Show and has guest starred on a million shows, including: The Sopranos, Bones, Happy Endings, and The Mindy Project. Howard is a model/actress who has done over 50 national commercials and a handful of crappy tv movies. Brandy is the quintessential hot mom in commercials, and has recently been featured in Spike Jonze's Kenzo World ad campaign.

Julie will be performing Friday night, while Julie & Brandy will be leading comedy writing workshops on Saturday.



## #BlackTransMagick

J Mase III is a Black/trans/queer poet based in Seattle by way of NYC. A blogger for the Huffington Post, he is author of "If I Should Die Under the Knife, Tell My Kidney I was the Fiercest Poet Around" as well as "And Then I Got Fired: One Transqueer's Reflections on Grief, Unemployment and Inappropriate Jokes About Death" As an educator, J Mase has worked with thousands of community members in the US, the UK and Canada on the needs of LGBTQIA youth and adults in spaces such as k-12 schools, universities, faith communities and restricted care facilities among others. He is the founder of the international performance tour Cupid Ain't @#\$%!: An Anti-Valentine's Day Poetry Movement and founder of awQward, the first ever trans & queer people of color specific talent agency.

An actor, singer, dancer and writer, Lady Dane began producing her own cabarets at the age of seventeen and made her New York cabaret debut at Don't Tell Mama's in 2011. After beginning to study the dances of her ancestors at Mamasita Studio, she began combining African, Latin and Native American rhythms to her shows. Although primarily known for her explosive style of cabaret, Lady Dane is a passionate actor who has worked at such theaters as the Kennedy Center, Adventure Theater, Round House Theater, Theater for the New City, Spooky Action Theater, Arena Stage, and LaMama in New York in which she originated the role of Madame Cordelia Mcclain. She has also produced a reading of her new musical, Roaring, and premiered a workshop of her one woman show, Klytmnestra, at Spooky Action Theatre. A poet and an advocate for Trans Voices in the arts, she became the first Trans Woman of Color in DC to be a published author of a work of fiction, Yemaya's Daughters .



#### **Dr. Kevin Nadal**

Dr. Kevin Leo Yabut Nadal is an award-winning scholar/activist who received his doctorate in counseling psychology from Columbia University in New York City. Currently, he is the Executive Director of the CLAGS: The Center for LGBTQ Studies at the Graduate Center (GC) at the City University of New York (CUNY), as well as an Associate Professor of psychology at both John Jay College of Criminal Justice and GC- CUNY. He is one of the leading researchers in understanding the impacts of microaggressions, or subtle forms of discrimination, on the mental and physical health of people of color; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and gueer (LGBTQ) people; and other marginalized groups. He has published over 90 works on multicultural issues in the fields of psychology and education. He is the author of five books including Filipino American Psychology: A Handbook of Theory, Research, and Clinical Practice (2011, John Wiley and Sons), Filipino American Psychology: A Collection of Personal Narratives (2010, Author House), Women and Mental Disorders (2011, Praeger), That's So Gay: Microaggressions and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Community (2013, APA Books), and Filipinos in New York City (2015, Arcadia). He is the President of the Asian American Psychological Association, a National Trustee of the Filipino American National Historical Society (FANHS), and a co-founder of the LGBTQ Scholars of Color Network. He has received the Early Career Award for Contributions to Excellence by the Asian American Psychological Association, the Emerging Professional Award for Research from the American Psychological Association Society for the Psychological Study of Culture, Ethnicity and Race, and the Early Career Award for Research from the American Psychological Association Minority Fellowship Program. Finally, he is the host of Out Talk with Dr. Kevin Nadal - a talk show focusing on social justice issues in the US.
