



**MUSC131 Group Piano Instruction II**  
**Syllabus**  
**(Fall 2012)**

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***Course Information***

**Course Outcomes**

After successfully completing this course, students will be able to:

- Play at sight simple pieces utilizing independent left- and right-hand parts.
- Play all major and minor scales utilizing proper fingering patterns, posture and hand position.
- Play finger and hand strengthening exercises as assigned by instructor.
- Demonstrate a knowledge of basic chord theory and structure by playing written parts and deciphering chord symbols.
- Interpret dynamic, tempo, and expression markings to add sensitivity into their performance at the keyboard.
- Prepare for final performance a medium-level "sonatina" or equivalent to be performed at quarter's end with assigned sight-reading and scales.

**How Outcomes Will Be Met**

The learning objectives of the course will be met through hands-on, in-class practice; lecture; at-home practice and study; and coaching by the instructor.

**Grading & Assignments**

Exams will examine performance progress toward the specific skill objectives outlined in the course outcomes. Tests will primarily involve student performances on the piano, playing selected pieces individually for the instructor. In addition, perceived effort (record of attendance and evidence of time spent practicing, as

shown through individual progress), will count for approximately one-quarter of the final grade.

#### **Books and Materials Required**

- Required text: Progressive Class Piano (2nd ed.), by Elmer Heerema (Alfred Publishing)
- Headphones or earbuds for the electronic keyboards
- Appropriate plug adaptor (usually 1/8" to 1/4") if your headphones or earbuds don't already have a 1/4" jack.
