COURSE INFORMATION

Course Outcomes

- Outcomes are determined by individual students level of competence at the time the class is undertaken.
- Students will be able to demonstrate that they have extended their knowledge base and technique by the end of the class.

Course Description

This class is intended for students who have completed Photo I, Digital Photo I or Photo II. This class will enable continued use of the photography lab facilities in order to extend ones understanding of photography as a medium of artistic expression. The class will consist of 3 meetings – attendance is required during the first week, mid-term and final. Being that this is a darkroom course, students are required to provide a minimum of 10 prints that meet or exceed expectations in photograph craft and construction.

May be repeated for a maximum of 3 credits. Prerequisite: ART 150.

Grading

Course graded pass/fail. Work must meet a minimum grade of C or higher to Pass. If at any point during the term you would like to discuss your grade and or progress in the class, please make an appointment to meet.

Factors considered into assigned grades: Effort, Attitude, Participation, Attendance, Technical Accomplishment, Aesthetic Aptitude, and Conceptual Exploration. Preferred qualities are signs of artistic growth and development, therefore, quality is emphasized over quantity.

Final grade breakdown is as follows:

10% First Meeting25% Mid-term Critique (must have 6 working prints)65% Final Critique (must turn in 12 final prints)Must have grade of C or higher for Pass.
