# New Library Media Center Combines "Comfy" with High Tech

The visually impressive new Library Media Center (LMC), located in Room D-126, is a comfortable place that invites study, learning and leisure.

With upholstered chairs, high ceilings and plenty of natural light, it's a haven where you want to curl up with a book or magazine and stay awhile. The ambiance is very different from the cramped quarters in the L Building where the library was housed for more than two years while the D Building was reconstructed.

"The library keeps evolving to reflect changes in technology and the diversity of the student body, including ethnicity, language, learning styles, special needs and whether they are on-campus or online students," said Myra Van Vactor, Director of the Library Media Center. "One example is a growing collection of books and magazines for ESL students,"

An increasing number of digital options are available on the library's website (www.bellevuecollege.edu/lmc), and accessible from anywhere you can use a computer, making it convenient for students who have limited time to come to the library, or distance education students.

# **Rooms for Student Use**

"The newly remodeled library has many more study and viewing rooms where students can collaborate, prepare projects, or hold group discussions and practice presentations and get video feedback, and ASL students can "sign" their homework," said Adam Burke, Media Center manager. There are also study, viewing and listening carrels for individuals throughout the library.

# **New Electronic Media Options**

Burke can't bridle his enthusiasm for the new media equipment and facilities. Viewing and production facilities for students, faculty and staff include: a 40-person multi-media viewing room, three 6-person viewing rooms and multi-media editing suite. For a \$2 an hour rental fee there are editing suites where, unlike those in the open computer lab, you don't have to be a media student to use them. The suites contain computers with FinalCutPro editing software. There are four editing bays: one audio and three video.

"We have surround sound like in movie theatres," said Burke. Surround sound is the name for a variety of techniques for expanding and enriching the sound of audio playback created by recording additional sound channels that can be reproduced on additional speakers. "It helps the students taking animation, computer gaming and movie-making classes," said Burke, "It's helpful to see and hear old movies and get the full effect of the sound from the original movie."

Instructor Michael Korolenko agrees: "In my Comm 103 Media and Messages class, we spend an entire week on motion picture sound and why it is so important. Surround sound gives you the feeling that whatever is happening on screen is going on all around you. Jets seem to fly overhead, explosions are heard behind you, and yells are heard in front of you. When you have bad sound, you lose a major component of the motion-picture experience."

# **Online Catalog of Videos, CDs, DVDs & Tapes**

Audiovisual and digital materials include DVDs, videos, CDs, records, cassettes and audio books. Another new feature is the online catalog of more than 344 feature films. Students can view the videos in one of the video viewing rooms for up to three hours.

# **Computers, Internet and Wireless Access**



"We lend out laptops as well as network cards for campus use," said Burke. Use the LMC's computer workstations to access all of BCC's online resources and the Internet. Additional computers are set up to be usable by students

with disabilities or special needs. Wireless network access is also available.

# BCC Grad Cites 'Quality of Program' in Winning National Essay Contest

Michael Bailey, a 2005 Bellevue Community College radiation therapy graduate who also will be part of the college's first class of bachelor's degree students in radiation and imaging sciences, is the winner of a national essay contest of the Community College Baccalaureate Association (CCBA).

The \$1,000 prize was presented at the CCBA conference in New Orleans in March. The contest essay topic was, "Why is it important for me to earn my baccalaureate degree on my community college campus?"

"BCC radiation therapy graduates (two-year degrees) continually rank high in American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) reports," Bailey wrote. "This is quite noteworthy as this national certification report includes not just associate programs nationwide, but baccalaureate and hospital based programs as well. Because BCC already ranks so high, I prefer to stay at BCC to complete my education as most cancer centers already acknowledge the quality of the program and its reputation for graduating qualified radiation therapists."

"I plan to be in the first group of [BCC baccalaureate] graduates," Bailey added, "to show the legislators and the people of Washington that BCC, a community college, is on the forefront of providing the region with highly-trained individuals in the field of health care."

Bailey works as a radiation therapist at Swedish Cancer Institute in Seattle.

# **Basic Information**

# **Eligibility for BCC**

If you are 18 or older or have earned a high school diploma, you are welcome to apply for admission and take college credit classes. High school students may enroll at BCC; contact the High School Programs Office, (425) 564-2026.

# **How to Enroll in Credit Classes**

# 1. Admission

If you are new to BCC or returning after two or more quarters, you will need to submit an admission application. Please access the BCC website, www.bellevuecollege.edu to apply. BCC requires an admissions fee of \$26.55 for your application to be processed. By applying early you will receive information about when you may begin enrolling, and information about assessment, advising, and other steps to follow. You can also learn your registration time online after your admission fee has been received and the application is processed. If you do not meet the admissions deadline, you may still register for classes. See Registration section (#4 below). Follow online application instructions for payment. Attach payment to paper applications. Admission fee is non-refundable.

# 2. Assessment

An English and math assessment and advising is mandatory for first-time college students and strongly recommended for all others. It identifies your skill level and appropriate course placement and is required before registering for some classes.

Assessments are given in room B132. Please bring picture ID and the \$17.80 assessment fee.

You may also take math and English assessments in the North Campus Testing Center, on a space-available basis. Call (425) 564-4006 for available times.

# 3. Drop-In Academic Advising

New Students: Academic advising and planning is crucial to reach your academic goals successfully. Beginning June 4, faculty and staff advisors will be on hand to review your assessment scores, discuss degree options, help you choose your classes, design an educational plan, and assist you with registration. See below for details.

NOTE: First-time- to-college students are required to take assessments and bring the scores to the advising and registration appointment.

# 4. Web Registration



# If you are:

- A current student or a returning student who earned credits in any of the two previous quarters (or four quarters after July 1, 2006) OR
- A new student or a returning student who earned credits more than two quarters ago (or four quarters after July 1, 2006) AND who submitted an admission application and \$26.55 fee by May 15

you will be assigned a registration access time. You can check this time on the Web. You also will receive registration information including your "access time" via your e-mail. If you don't receive this information, make sure the college has your correct e-mail address - check the website or visit the Student Service Center. You may register for classes on the Web from your assigned access time through the third day of the academic quarter. You may drop or withdraw from classes on the Web until the end of the fifth week, July 29.

#### If you are:

 A new or former student who applied after May 15

you will be assigned an access time for Web registration within 2-4 days after your application and \$26.55 admission fee is processed by the Admissions Office. You can check this time on the Web. You also will receive registration information, including your "access time," via your e-mail. If you don't receive this information, make sure the college has your correct e-mail address; check the website or visit the Student Services Center. You may register for classes on the Web from your assigned access time through the third day of the academic quarter. You may drop or withdraw from classes on the Web until the end of the fifth week, July 29.

To use Web registration, you must know your Student Identification Number and your Personal Identification Number (PIN). Your birth date is initially assigned as your PIN. For your own protection, please change your PIN the first time you use Web registration.

#### Registration for Distance Education:

BCC offers many televised and online courses. You may register for these classes on the Web at any time through the third day of the quarter. If you need a hard copy registration form, call (425) 564-2438. See page 43 for Distance Education requirements and fees.

#### The Waiting List Feature:

All full courses are using the waitlist process. This feature offers students a fair and consistent method of being enrolled in a full class if openings occur. If a class with the waiting list option is full, you can choose to be put on the waiting list. It is possible to be enrolled in the class when a space becomes available, through the third day of the quarter. You can add your name to a waiting list on the Web, or in person at the Registration Office. If you decide you no longer want to be on the waiting list for a class, return to Web registration to check your wait list status, or come into the Registration Office to have your name removed from the waiting list. Please check your schedule daily through the third day of the quarter to find out if you have been enrolled into the class, and to be informed of your tuition and fees. If you register into another section of the same class you are waitlisted for, you will be dropped from the waitlisted section. If you have not been registered via the waiting list process by the first day of classes, go to the class on the first day for further instructions.

#### 5. Payment

Tuition and fees are due within seven calendar days from the student's first date of registration OR by the first day of the quarter, whichever comes first. If you register on or after the first day of the quarter, tuition and fees are due immediately. If you register on or after the fourth day of the quarter, you must obtain a permission-to-enroll card. If you register on or after July 5, a \$112.95 late-registration fee will be charged for each course in addition to the regular tuition and fees.

You may pay your tuition and fees by VISA or MasterCard online or at the cashier's office in the Student Services Building. You may pay by check through the mail, or by check or cash at the cashier's office.

You are responsible for verifying that payment has been made; for example, if you are receiving financial aid that comes directly to the college.

#### **Drop for Non-Payment:**

Non-payment of tuition and course-related fees (including returned checks and/or credit cards) may result in the student being withdrawn from classes. (BCC Policy 6121). A \$17.80 withdrawal fee will be charged if you have ever been dropped for non-payment in the past. Returned checks and/or credit card charges are assessed a fee of \$28.80.

Admission to or registration for classes with the college, conferring of degrees, and issuance of academic transcripts may be withheld for failure to meet financial obligations to the college and may result in the account being sent to a collection service (BCC Policy 5150). All collection fees are the responsibility of the check/credit card writer and/or the student. If a student writes three checks (including third-party checks) which are returned, his/her privilege of check-writing will be denied.

#### **Technology Fee:**

The technology fee ensures that all credit students have access to computers and related technology in a quality learning environment. The fee is \$3.50 per credit, to a maximum of \$35.

# Refunds for Withdrawing or Dropping

If you withdraw from the college or drop classes, you may be eligible for a refund. The college begins to process refunds after the third day of classes. A \$7.90 processing fee is deducted from the refund amount.

The amount refunded is based on your withdrawal or drop date for courses that begin the first week of the quarter. See calendar (p. 5) for the last days for 100% and 50% refunds. Classes with alternate start and end dates will be governed by a different refund policy. Please contact enrollment services.

If the college drops you from classes for disciplinary reasons you will not be eligible for a refund. Some fees are identified as non-refundable in the class listings. Self-supporting programs may have different refund policies. Contact the program office for details.

Refunds under \$25 will not be processed but will be applied to the next academic quarter.

#### Residency

Your Washington State residency status determines your basic tuition for most college credit classes. If you have questions about eligibility requirements for residency for tuition purposes, please contact the residency office at (425) 564-4143 or (425) 564-2205. Information is also available online at www.bellevuecollege.edu/enrollment/admissions/eligibility/.

Note: Residency status affects tuition & fees for state-supported classes only. Self-supporting programs charge the same amounts for residents and non-residents.

### **State Support for Community & Technical College Students**

#### **Parking Permits**

BCC students who have paid tuition and comprehensive fees are entitled to parking permits for their vehicles. Student parking permits are available from the Cashier's Office (B126) or the Public Safety Office (K100). Parking permits are required for parking 6:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

#### **General Parking Rules**

Student daytime parking is limited to areas designated Student Parking.

Staff/faculty daytime parking is limited to areas designated Employee Parking.

Parking after 3:00 p.m. for students, staff, and faculty is available in all designated parking areas with the exceptions of parking spaces for the disabled, the college motor pool, and specifically signed reserved areas. Students may not park in employee lots with signage stating "No Student Parking Anytime Mon – Fri."

Park one vehicle to a space, between a set of white lines.


No one may park at any time in roadways, fire lanes, bus zones, loading zones, service driveways; on sidewalks; or in the landscaping. No one may park in a reserved space without the appropriate permit or authorization.

#### **Students & Staff with Disabilities**

You may park in a space reserved for the disabled only if your vehicle displays a valid "Disabled Persons Parking Identification Placard" issued by the state of Washington. Disabled parking is available in most parking lots and in C-7 on the west side of campus.

#### **Visitors**

Visitors may park in Lot 4, or in the short-term parking stalls around campus.



#### **Carpools**

The first floor of the student parking garage is reserved for student carpools of 3 or more people. Carpool permits are available from the Public Safety Office and must be displayed on the dashboard of the carpool's vehicle.

# **Blocking the Roadway**

Waiting for a space to open up can create gridlock for everyone. Please come a little earlier or walk a little farther. Violators may be cited and their vehicles may be booted or towed.

# **Speed Limit**

The speed limit on campus is 20 miles per hour unless driving conditions require a slower speed.


#### **Pedestrians**

Pedestrians have the right of way at all times except for emergency vehicles using lights, sirens, etc.

# **Citations and Appeals**

Fines for violations range from \$10 to \$100. You may be ticketed for parking without a permit, parking in an unauthorized area, blocking a roadway, speeding, etc. If you do not pay the fine listed on the ticket, the college may delay your registration, place a hold on your transcripts or financial aid, or impound (tow away) your vehicle.

If you wish to appeal your ticket fill out a citation appeal form in the Public Safety Office (K100). You must file the appeal within 20 days after getting the ticket.
