





(A) Radio and TV Stations

Radio Station KBCS FM 91.3, founded in 1973, is a listener-supported, non-commercial radio station licensed to Bellevue College and heard throughout the Seattle Metropolitan region. The station features diverse music styles, along with progressive news and talk.

- Over 150 volunteer hosts, producers, and journalists
- Main broadcast tower location: Cougar Mountain.

TV Station – The College Channel 28 (Comcast Cable Channel 28) is Bellevue College's own on-site cable channel, and airs programming 24 hours a day, including educational programs, BC basketball games, and other college and community events.

- BC Television Services produces original, broadcast-quality video productions for the College and, through a partnership with the City of Bellevue, provides production crew and facilities for City of Bellevue productions.
- TV Services' video-production staff consists primarily of students enrolled in BC's Advanced Video Production certificate program.
