<u>Course Description</u>: This is an introductory level course in sociology. This class intends to give students a basic idea on sociology as an academic discipline. We will look at how our behavior and the development of our social institutions are shaped by various social forces.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, it is my hope that students will be able to:

- 1. have a basic understanding of sociology as an academic discipline
- 2. understand the basic premises of the major sociological perspectives/theories
- 3. apply sociological perspectives/theories to understand various social behavior
- 4. to have an understanding of the basic social research methods and principles
- 5. question the obvious
- 6. distinguish between factual statements and value judgment
- 7. critically evaluate the various perspectives in terms of their strengths and weakness
- 8. utilize objective criteria for evaluating sociological knowledge
- 9. ascertain cause and effect as well as correlation
- 10. formulate logical conclusions
- 11. apply knowledge to real life situations

<u>Class Format</u>: This is an online class. Most if not all class related activities will be conducted through the class Canvas site. Please check the class Canvas site regularly (i.e. daily) for latest posting on class announcement, assignment, discussion, examination and additional class reading materials. All class assignments due date and times are based on Pacific Standard Time Zone (PST). Students are responsible for reviewing the course syllabus, learning and keep up with all the class materials and tasks. Do not hesitate to contact me if there are questions or concerns about the class. Besides using email, students are welcome to request communicating with me through Zoom or similar platforms.

Assignment, Examination and Grading Policy:

Grades are determined by the points student earns through timely participation in online class activities such as writing assignments, discussions and examinations:

- (1) Writing assignments: These are textbook and/or assigned material based writing assignments. The purpose is to provide students opportunities to deepen their understanding or to apply concepts they have learned on a particular topic or topics.
- (2) Online Discussion and/or Activity: I will post discussion questions and/or activity on the class Canvas site weekly, which students are expected to respond. To earn credits, students must respond based on the guidelines provided within the specified time frame.
 - Students are expected to follow proper etiquette or netiquette when engaging in online discussion or related activities. Be respectful and courteous. Harrassing, bullying, demeaning, derogatory, racist, sexist, homophobic, proselytizing or victim-blaming comments will not be tolerated. It is acceptable to have disagreement in ideas but please do not engage in name calling, personal/character attacks or insults. This instructor reserves the right to delete messages that do not adhere to the above protocol.
- (3) Examinations: There will be two open-book, essay format examinations. Questions will be posted at least 72 hours before the submission due date for students to work on.

Failure to take an exam, turn in an assignment or participate in a discussion/activity by the due date may result in "zero point" for that task. The grade percentage (which is not weighted) shown at the class Canvas site may or may not be an accurate reflection of your actual course progress (i.e. course grade). It is possible students may have the opportunities to earn more than 300 points by the end of the quarter. Course grade is based on the number of points earned out of 300 points.

Assignment Due Date: Student should treat the due date as the last day that the assignments could be submitted.

<u>Late Assignment</u>: Students are expected to turn in the assignments by the due date. If an assignment is turned in late, twenty five percent (25%) of the points of that assignment will be deducted for each late day. The assignment will be locked and submission will not be allowed three days after the assignment due date. Examinations have to be turned in by the due date and no late submission will be accepted.

INCOMPLETE GRADE ("I"):

If a student fails to complete all the required work, the student may request a grade of Incomplete ("I"). Agreeing to issue an incomplete grade is at the discretion of the instructor. The following conditions must be met for an incomplete (I) grade to be considered:

- Students must request an incomplete grade
- Students must have completed 85% of the required coursework by the time the quarter ends
- Students must have earned at least a C average for all submitted coursework
- Students must reach an agreement with their instructors regarding when the missing coursework will be completed

PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES OF THE SOCIAL SCIENCE DIVISION Fall 2020

Student Conduct Code and Academic Integrity*

Any act of academic dishonesty, including cheating, plagiarism (using the ideas or words of another as one's own without crediting the source), and fabrication, and inappropriate/disruptive classroom behavior are violations of the Student Conduct Code of Bellevue College. Incomplete Grade

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete ("I"). The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade (usually an "F") (https://www.bellevuecollege.edu/policies/id-3000/)

F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

The Social Science Division will adhere to the final examination schedule as stated in the BC Schedule (https://www.bellevuecollege.edu/policies/id-3250/). Final examinations will be held at the end of each quarter at fixed times. Instructors will not give examinations in advance of the regular schedule. A student who is absent from any examination held at any time during the quarter may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be present at any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course (https://www.bellevuecollege.edu/registration/withdrawing/).
