MENTORING

CALL FOR 2017-18 MENTORS



For the first time, we are recruiting mentors for both our tenure mentoring program as well as our adjunct mentoring program. These

programs bring first-year tenure-track faculty, and adjunct faculty together with experienced mentors. In this one-year program, mentees get to know the Bellevue College culture of Teaching and Learning Excellence, explore their roles, responsibilities and individual goals with the guidance of an advocate in their mentor without the pressure of formal evaluation.

Minimum time commitment: 18 hours over the academic year.

Stipend: \$500 through the Office of Instruction and Faculty Commons.

TEACHING SQUARES

Online Teaching Squares

Fully online – June 27 - August 4

Positive! Supportive! Online! Guided! Non-evaluative!



Review basic online teaching best practices, and then find positive attributes in a colleague's hybrid or online course that you can apply

to your own course. Online Teaching Squares allows adjunct or full-time faculty to gain new perspectives and insights into their teaching through a supportive and completely non-evaluative process. It works through a process of reciprocal online class observation and self-reflection on one's own online teaching.

Each Online Teaching Square consists of three to four faculty members, preferably from different disciplines, who observe each other's online course for a quarter and then discuss, through a guided process, what they've learned from the observations.

Upon completion of all deliverables, participants will receive 16 professional development hours and a **\$300 stipend**, funded by the Faculty Commons.

- How to convert text-based teaching contents into a "visual explanation"
- · Basic techniques for making your visual content accessible to sensory diverse viewers based on Quality Matters standards and Universal Design for Learning principles.
