

I want to become a teacher... where do I start?

- 1. Decide what *subject* you want to teach.
- 2. Decide which *age level* you want to teach.

There are over **30 different endorsements** (or teachable subjects) in Washington State, from Elementary Education to Visual Arts. Think about the classes you have liked best; chances are you will be most successful (and happy!) teaching a subject you enjoy and know well.

What type of setting do you want to teach in? Do you enjoy working more with small children or young adults?

- Elementary teachers usually teach all subject areas (English, Writing, Math, Science, Social Studies)
- Middle and High-School teachers usually focus on one particular subject area (such as Biology).
- **Specialist** teachers (Music, Art, Drama, Technology, Special Education) are typically certified in all grade levels and can teach in various settings.
- **Early Childhood**: Some universities offer an endorsement in P-3 for those interested in focusing on early childhood teaching. If students want to work in a childcare or daycare setting, they are not typically required to complete a Bachelor degree but could complete a 1 year certificate program or 2 year professional technical degree in Early Childhood Education here at Bellevue College (*note: the Early Childhood program at BC does not transfer to a Bachelor degree program or lead to teacher certification*)

Which degree from Bellevue College will help me become a teacher?

- Bellevue College <u>does not</u> have a teacher certification program. However, students can complete the first two years of general education and education prerequisites while fulfilling degree requirements for the **Associate in Arts and Sciences** transfer degree. Regardless of your certification or specialty, every teacher in Washington State must have a **Bachelor's** degree from an accredited institution.
- Those interested in Middle or High School Math Teaching can follow the Associate in Math Education degree.

What are some common prerequisites that I'll need to take here?

Every university's teacher education program will require slightly different prerequisites. It is **highly recommended** that you speak with a representative at the target university in conjunction with an academic advisor here at BC to ensure that you are taking the proper course sequence. Below is a general guide to the types of classes **<u>RECOMMENDED</u>** for students interested in teaching. All Teachers could take:

After you complete your Associate in Arts and Sciences degree, there are three different pathways you can take to obtain teacher certification in Washington State.

Pathway 2: Bachelor's Degree in any area + teacher certification program.

Pathway 3: **Bachelor's Degree in any Area + Master's in Teaching**. Similar to pathway 2, this option allows a teacher to major in a subject at the 4-year level and then receive teacher training/certification through a Master's degree.

Time at University: 4+ years (2 years for Bachelor's and 2 years for Master's) **Special Considerations**: Teachers with Master's degrees tend to have higher salaries.
