Consider this: It is estimated that it takes 350 hours for one office staff person in one division to manage the current paper-based student evaluation system. More than one quarter's worth of work! This includes typing comments, creating packets, managing the packets and distributing them.

And where does all that paper go when all is said and done? Whether lost or filed, the advantages of going paperless include quicker access to student feedback, easier data aggregation and significant cost savings.

This Fall, in its ongoing commitment to link sustainability to operational efficiency and fiscal responsibility, the EAC is sponsoring an ongoing pilot this academic year to help the college transition to paperless student evaluations. The savings are significant for employees, the budget crisis and the environment.
