Since the TELOS program began in 1976, the oak tree has been its distinctive symbol. Telos is the Greek word ($\tau\epsilon\lambda\sigma\varsigma$) meaning 'fulfillment'. And that's what the TELOS program offers: an engaging community where adults can fulfill their continuing desire to learn and grow.

This course will explore the surrealist movement that emerged in France between the World Wars. Although the movement is commonly understood as one of the most influential in the history of twentieth century art, the surrealists' foremost aim was to generate an intellectual, social, and political revolution to transform life in France and beyond. This course will examine the revolutionary history of the movement, including its formation as a response to the trauma of World War I, and its engagement with broader debates about colonialism, communism, and the role of art in modern society. British Cinema: 20th Century

The United Kingdom has had a significant film industry for over a century. While film production reached an all-time high in 1936, the "golden age" of British cinema is usually thought to have occurred in the 1940s and 1950s, during which the directors David Lean, Michael Powell and Carol Reed produced their most critically acclaimed works. But the 1960s and 1970s were an equally rich period, with the emergence of such young talents as Tony Richardson, John Boorman, Lindsay Anderson, Ken Russell and many others. This course will be an informative, educational and entertaining look at some of the best British films, directors and performers of the 20th century. As always, an excess of film clips will dazzle your sensations. Fee: \$85

This course will examine the role of art and music in history as a response to social realities and as a component of the formation and sustainability of civil movements. We will consider the potential influence of art on society, and the creative impulse as a component of being human and a force of self-definition in the face of suffering and confusion. Along the way, the class will share and explore visual arts, music, theatre, sculpture, and literature and consider the significance of individual artists (Bernice Johnson Reagon, Pablo Picasso, Toni Morrison, Tupac Shakur, Maya Lin and others). U.S. Mexico Borderlands: History, Culture and Identity

This course establishes a broad understanding of American history as a dynamic, contested, and creative cultural encounter of Indigenous-Afro-Eurasian cultures and people. The borderlands framing is one which acknowledges the people already on the land before the arrival of Europeans, while also recognizing geopolitical conflicts of European powers in the Americas. In the context of the Atlantic world and the frontier, we will look at the formation of the United States in relation to New Spain and Mesoamérica. As much as possible, we will draw on first-hand accounts to illuminate the complexity of the borderlands and the implications for today. The "residue" of this history exists in our place names, foods, styles, and language. By considering the creative artifacts of the past as primary historical documents including art, music, dance and spoken word expressions of identity, hybridity, and nationalism in order to foster the awareness of how our contemporary pluralism has its roots in historical borderlands. Painting Seasonal Blooms

An art course that takes inspiration from the favorite blooms in each season. A perfect way to appreciate the beauty of change and color in nature through painting. With step-by-step instructions, and lots of drawing exercises students will learn to draw and paint from their reference (image or a real flower). This course will also take the students through the basics of watercolor painting starting with the types of materials and tools that one can use to the techniques in handling the medium. Students will learn about value, basic composition, color mixing, blending, and the mechanics of watercolor. Approaches such as 'wet in wet' and working in layers will be introduced. With demonstrations and constant individual guidance, they will be able to start working on their own piece at their pace. This course will equip the students with basic knowledge and an understanding of the medium and leave them feeling comfortable to pursue their passion for watercolor! Fee: \$85

The Beatles

The Beatles were (and still are) arguably the most influential musical group in the history of popular music. As musicians, practically every one of their albums broke new ground. They demonstrated that rock & roll could incorporate a great variety of musical styles, harmonies and song forms. They were one of the first rock groups to write most of their own music, initiating the era of self-contained bands. From their early songs to their later ground-breaking studio masterpieces, the Beatles set new standards for both commercial and artistic success in popular music. This course traces the development of The Beatles, from their beginnings to their careers as solo artists, both from a musical and a cultural perspective. It will offer a historical and critical analysis of their monumental contribution, not only in music but in Western culture as well. Lots of audio and video clips will have you on your own personal Magical Mystery Tour. Fee: \$85


