Since the TELOS program began in 1976, the oak tree has been its distinctive symbol. Telos is the Greek word (τέλος) meaning ‘fulfillment.’ And that’s what the TELOS program offers: an engaging community where adults can fulfill their continuing desire to learn and grow.

TELOS presents a broad range of classes to meet a wide variety of interests. The atmosphere is intellectually stimulating and supportive. Classes are small and informal. Students and faculty interact as peers, making learning a creative exchange of ideas. Many students form lasting friendships.

At TELOS the emphasis is on education and growth, not measuring performance. There are no entrance requirements, grades, or tests.

Basic Photography Principles

This course introduces students to basic photographic principles and the use of cameras, lenses, and lighting equipment. There will also be a brief overview of the history of photography and the development of cameras and lenses over the last century. To better understand how cameras turn light into images, there will be simple explanations and comparisons of how film cameras and digital cameras work. Discussions will include basic composition concepts to enhance images. The course will conclude with information on image file handle and simple image manipulation with basic photo editing tools. Students will also have an opportunity to participate in a fun weekly photo assignment involving shooting a common theme and critiquing the results. Fee: \$99

Students will receive a list of the poets for each week. Attendees will have an opportunity to contribute to the overall discussion and share their knowledge, likes or dislikes of the various artists and recordings being featured. Expanding Community Education Offerings

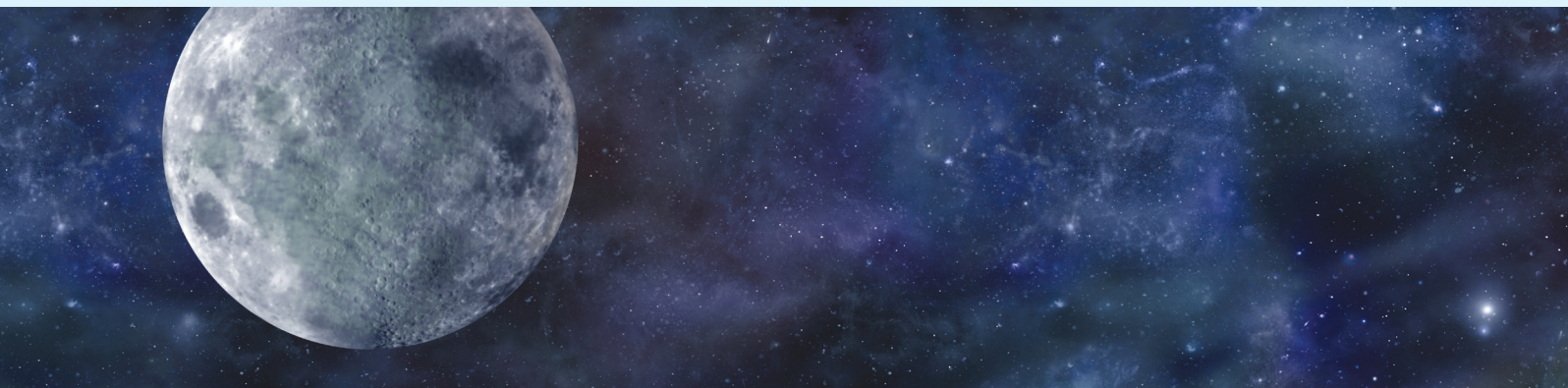

When Ron Hobbs learned that NASA was recruiting volunteers to “share the excitement of space exploration” he knew it was something he could do. Being accepted as an education and public outreach volunteer in the Solar System Ambassadors Program led to working at the Museum of Flight, and teaching in K–12 classrooms and at the TELOS Program.

Ron continually hears from astronauts and cosmonauts that the experience of seeing the Earth from afar against the blackness of space is a transformational experience, something that has been called the Overview Effect. He believes that learning about astronomy and space science allows us to use what Carl Sagan called the “spaceship of our imagination” to experience that planetary perspective. As far as he is concerned, this perspective is a prerequisite for the continued development of a truly just and sustainable civilization on this planet and any other worlds human beings choose to inhabit.

“As someone who dreamed of exploring Mars, I have always seen “nature” in the grandest of terms, as the whole universe. My personal learning goal is to know my home in the Milky Way Galaxy like I know the neighborhood of my home in Seattle,” states Ron.

Planets, Start and Galaxies will be an in-person course at the main campus, starting on September 28, running every Thursday through November 16, 2023.
