Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- 1. Acquire and critique the use of primary source statistics in assessing the health of a macroeconomy.
- 2. Explain the relationships between economic growth, unemployment, and inflation.
- 3. Recognize the importance of the Federal Reserve's regulatory role in money and banking.
- 4. Evaluate the pros and cons of proposed macroeconomic stabilization policy.
- 5. Examine factors that influence long-run growth and productivity.
- 6. Describe how the internationalization of our economy has changed the outcomes and choices of our domestic economy.
- 7. Critically analyze the positive and negative impacts of markets as they relate to social justice and environmental issues.
- 8. Represent and understand economic concepts and outcomes in numerical and graphical form.

Grades

Your total grade for this course will be computed using the following weights. Item Descriptions

- The final exam is cumulative and timed and will be available in Canvas between 12:01 am Saturday, March 21st. and 11:59 pm on Monday, March 23rd at 11:59 pm.
- Graded problem sets are found in the supplemental learning management tool, Sapling Learning. You will need to log into that site and complete these problem sets there. You will be locked out of each assignment after the due date, so be sure to submit your answers before that time. If you have any technical or grade issue within this system, please contact Sapling Learning as they will be able to resolve the issues for you:I am not able to make grade modifications for Sapling assignments. Note that you get <u>unlimited</u> attempts at each question in Sapling Learning, but each incorrect answer will lower your score 5% for that question. I will transfer grades from Sapling Learning into Canvas on a weekly basis.
- **Midterm:** will be available for 48 hours up until the 11:59 pm on the due date. The midterm is a timed exam.
- **Discussions** are larger/longer assignments and require the student to synthesize numerous sources to form a supported opinion on a topic. Students are required to make an original post and respond to peers' posts.
- **Applications** come in the form of guided inquiries on research papers, articles, websites, talks or films. NOTE: these applications might show up as "quizzes" because I am limited to the structure Canvas has to offer, but these are not quizzes in the true sense of the word. You have 2 attempts at each question.
- **Explorations** should be treated like short-answer/essay questions on an exam. They are your chance to demonstrate that you grasp a concept. But, they are different from an exam question because you post your answer in a small discussion group. You are not required to comment on others' work, but explorations will grant you the opportunity to: 1) find out what concepts you still need more work on, 2) how other students view the material, and 3) be exposed to a concept multiple times. You will find all the information you need to answer an exploration in your textbook and do not need to refer to outside sources.

Additionally, please note that there are self-quizzes at the end of each lecture. It is recommended that you do these quizzes (they contain between 2-11 questions each) to check your understanding of the material. These quizzes do not count for points, but they will help you prepare for the Module Quizzes and the Final Exam.

Points and weights

Each assignment has a point score assigned to it. Scores for each main component of your grade will be weighted so that the total points for that component are 100. This weighted score, not the raw score, is used in the calculation of final grades.

Deadlines/Due Dates

Each assignment has a due date. For simplicity, all assignments with the exception of of the Sapling problem sets are due at 11:55 pm on the due date. Sapling problem sets are due at 11:55 pm. Please make every attempt to begin assignments well before the due date. The instructor will accept up to 3 late assignments as long as the assignments are turned in within <u>3 days</u> of the original due date. Further missed assignments will result in a score of 0 for that assignment. No late submissions at all will be accepted for the midterm or the final exam.

<u>Extra Credit</u>

Students may earn 2.5 points of extra credit added to the weighted midterm score when they turn in proof that they have evaluated this course.

The explorations and discussions have scoring rubrics attached to them. Please read through the rubric before submitting your work so you are aware of how you will be assessed on each assignment.

Distribution of Grades

Throughout the quarter, you will be able to see your total points in Canvas. Be sure to check grades often and notify the instructor of any potential discrepancies.
