INTRODUCTION TO GEOGRAPHY: Syllabus

Geography 100:

Welcome to Geography 100. This is a five-credit course that fulfills a Social Science distribution requirement for the Associate in Arts and Sciences (AAS) Degree at Bellevue College. There are no prerequisites for this class. This is the only class that is a required class for those who wish to obtain a

'Concentration in Geography' - you need a total of 20 credits for this award.

Course Description:

The course will cover a series of major themes of geographic inquiry. The dynamic nature of the physical environment will be studied and this will provide a foundation to better understand the cultural landscapes

of our world.

Specific areas of investigation will focus on: the role of maps and mapmakers; physical processes and the surface of the Earth; a review of the dynamics of weather and climate; the impact of population growth; and additional in depth case studies focusing on population and demography, population distribution and the economic resource base, migration, urbanization, globalization and sustainability as well as a review

of the major features of the cultural landscape.

Course Objectives:

To consider the basic themes of geography and how they are applied to explore the relationships between physical and cultural landscapes to provide a foundation in geographic inquiry that will act as a catalyst for future study and to develop a sense of place by fostering a sense of the connectivity that exists between the physical and the cultural world.

Format:

The coursework is divided into 10 Chapters each with a Chapter Quiz: 10 Map Quizzes: 5 Discussion Topics; a Regional Quiz: and a Final Exam.

a) Course Chapters and Chapter Quizzes:

Each of the chapters in the class covers one key theme of geographic inquiry and all of the material that you need is in the class ebooks, 'Introduction to Geography' and 'World Place Locations.' The 'Introduction to Geography' ebook has the 10 Chapters that we will study and the 'World Place Locations' ebook is used for the map quizzes and the Regional Quiz.

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It is important to start by developing a **Study Guide** for this class - a notebook of all key ideas/answers to all questions/and any material that will help you to remember the content. You can use this Study Guide in all of the 'open book' quizzes.

Having carefully read through each chapter, made all appropriate notes in your Study Guide notebook

and answered the fifteen **Review Questions** at the end of the chapter you are ready to take the **Chapter Quiz**. Each Chapter Quiz has an open book/open note format with **multiple-choice** questions and is answered totally online using the ebook assessment system. Please note that we will use the ebook assessment system to complete the Chapter Quizzes(not the Canvas assessment system).

There will be 10 questions in each **Chapter Quiz** - 5 will be selected from the 15 Review Questions and there will be an additional 5 questions from material in the relevant chapter.

Again – please note that all exams are open book/open note - remember to 'Save' the answers before you 'Submit' the quiz.

The order of the Chapter Exams will be exactly the same as the Chapters in the ebook - you will have 10 multiple choice questions (5 selected from the Review Questions at the end of the chapter and 5 additional questions from the material in the chapter) and each Chapter Quiz is worth 30 marks (3 marks per correct answer for a grand total of 300 marks).

The opening chapter is an Introduction to the book - followed by -

Chapter 2: Maps and Mapmakers

Chapter 3: Physical Geography: the Surface of the Earth

Chapter 4: Physical Geography: Weather and Climate

Chapter 5: Population and Demography

Chapter 6: Population Distribution and the Economic Resource Base

Chapter 7: Geography of Migration

Chapter 8: Geography of Urbanization

Chapter 9: Cultural Geography

Chapter 10: Geography of Globalization

Chapter 11: Geography of Sustainability

b) Map Quizzes - World Place Locations:

Please note - this is done using the online textbook 'World Place Locations.'

You will be required to study place locations for the eight major world regions (listed below). **There are 10** online Map Quizzes with 15 questions in each quiz (total 150 marks).

Note that - Europe and Russia and - North America - are both divided into two quizzes each, a cultural quiz and a physical quiz. In all of the other regional map quizzes the cultural and physical locations are combined into one quiz (cultural is cities and countries and physical is seas, rivers, mountains, deserts and lakes etc).

Preparation for the quizzes is done by completing the respective chapters in the **World Place Locations online ebook** and referencing an atlas of your choice.

For your convenience you may access the A-Z Maps website which is available to you through the College Library - this is an online atlas and we also recommend that you print off from this Library resource your own blank maps of the regions for revision purposes. We suggest that you follow the link on the website to **download the blank maps** and label all of the required locations on the blank map - this will help you to better remember the locations for the guiz.

Preparation for the quizzes is done by completing the respective sections in the World Place Locations online workbook, using the blank outline maps – for these go to the College Library site and the blank map PDFs are all on the Periodicals page - under A-Z Maps - scroll down to see 'Blank Maps' - all the blank maps can be printed for revision purposes.

To ensure success, read the **Instructions to the Student** for suggestions, hints, and guidelines in the **World Place Locations** online ebook.

So - you fill in the blank maps and they are then used to practice identifying the locations listed in each Chapter in the workbook (you do not hand in these maps as they are only for your practice). The Place Location quizzes are all 'open book' matching format. Carefully, follow the online instructions when taking the quizzes.

You only have **8 minutes** to answer each Map Quiz so please be sure you know the locations well before you begin.

The 10 Map Quizzes and respective Chapters in the World Place Location online ebook are listed below.

Please note - The Major Features of the Planet Map Quiz is at the start of the World Place Location ebook and this is to be used for practice only – it will not count toward your score for the class – it is only for practice to give you a good idea of what to expect in the Map Quizzes.

Remember - Chapter 1 in your textbook considers the **Major Features of the Planet and is not assessed** and should be used as a practice map quiz before you begin the other map quizzes. However, it is advised that you plot the locations on a blank map of the world to allow you to become more familiar with the format of the workbook.

For the details of each **Discussion Topic** follow the link from the course Home Page - each discussion will secure a maximum of **15 marks**. To secure these marks your first post should discuss the topic under review and should be of approximately 250 words and your response post(s) in which you reflect on other comments by other students should be of about 100 words. **These are intended not to be simply 'copy and paste' from another source, but your own personal reflections and views associated with the topic in question.**

d) The Regional Quiz is done using the online ebook 'World Place Locations' assessment tool.

At the end of each of the eight chapters in the online textbook 'World Place Locations' you have 25 questions to answer and the 25 questions in the Regional Quiz will be chosen from these 200 questions (8 chapters with 25 questions each). You can earn a total of **50 marks** by doing the Regional Quiz. It is intended that it will be taken toward the end of the quarter when you have finished all of the map quizzes.

e) The Final Exam.

This will be worth 100 marks plus a possible 25 additional marks of extra credit. There will be 25 multiple choice questions (worth 3 marks each) all of which will be chosen from the 10 Chapter Review Questions as well as the questions asked in the Chapter Quizzes. In addition there will be a selection of 8 images and each will require a written response from you. Each image will require you to identify it and to write about the image with as much information as you can. They will each be worth 3 marks for correct identification and a maximum of an additional 4 marks for the discussion you submit.

Incomplete

F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

Final examinations may involve proctored on-campus arranged exams or may be administrated completely online at the discretion of the instructor and in keeping with the stated policies provided in the course syllabus. Please refer to the syllabus at the start of the quarter for additional details and contact the instructor directly for any clarifications. A student who is not in compliance with the scheduled format may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be in compliance with any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

Academic Year: College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.

Summer Quarter: College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the fifth week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). After the sixth day and through the end of the fifth week of the quarter, the "W" grade will become part of the student's transcript record.

Hardship Withdrawal (HW)

From page 9 of the current course catalog, 2008-2009 online catalog (Links to an external site.), HW indicates a withdrawal request made because of extenuating circumstances after the official withdrawal period is over. The student must contact the instructor to request this withdrawal option, or the faculty member may initiate the contact. No points are calculated into the grade-point average. Students may also contact the Enrollment Services office BEFORE grades are assigned in cases of hardship.
