

GEOGRAPHY 100:

INTRODUCTION TO GEOGRAPHY:

(Your teacher and friends in Livingston, Guatemala)

Welcome to Geography 100. This is a five-credit course that fulfills a Social Science distribution requirement for the Arts and Sciences (AAS) Degree at Bellevue College. There are no prerequisites for this class. This is the only class that is required for those who wish to obtain a 'Concentration in Geography' - you need a total of 20 credits for this award.

Course Description:

The course will cover a series of major themes of geographic enquiry. The dynamic nature of the physical environment provides a foundation on which the human/cultural landscape has evolved.

Specific areas of investigation will focus on an explanation of the parameters of geography: the role of maps and mapmaking; awareness of some of the major forces of physical processes and resulting topography; a review of the dynamics of the atmosphere and subsequent climate types; the impact of population growth; and case studies that take an in depth look at a series of issues including; sustainability and economic resources, globalization and major components of the cultural landscape.

Course Objectives:

To consider the basic themes of geography and how they are applied to explore the relationships between physical and human landscapes to provide a foundation in geographic inquiry that will act as a catalyst for future study and to develop a sense of place by fostering a sense of connectivity with both the physical and the cultural world.

Format:

The coursework is divided into **five Course Modules; ten Map Quizzes; Regional Quizzes; and 5 Discussion Topics.**

a) Course Modules:

Each of the five modules in the class covers one key theme of geographic inquiry and all of the material that you need is on the class website - apart from the textbooks. The 'Introduction to Geography' textbook is best viewed as a support tool for your studies as no questions will be taken directly out of this textbook for the exams. These questions will come from the material on the class notes and in the essential reading and viewing assignments – these will need to be carefully studied to be successful in this class.

All modules begin with **Class Notes**. These notes will help you to better understand the topics covered in the particular module. **You should begin each module by reading the Class Notes** and remember that some of the questions in the Midterm Exam will be from these notes.

Start by developing a **Study Guide** for this class - a book of all key ideas/answers to all questions/and any material that you need to remember the content.

The next step is to read through the directions that identify which chapters of the textbook you should read as a support to the class website materials.

Every module has an **Essential Reading/Viewing Section**. This is your next step. Read through these articles and/or view documentaries and answer all the related questions. You will be tested on this material in the module exams.

The last step in each module is the **Module Exam**. Having carefully read through and completed the **Class Notes and Essential Reading/Viewing Assignments** – and completed the related questions – you will then be prepared to take the respective Exam. Each of the Module Exams has an open book/open note format with **multiple-choice** questions and is answered online. To successfully complete the exams, it is imperative that you complete all of the questions in the exercises. **All module exam questions are directly based on the readings and exercises in the module.** Again – please note that all exams are open book/open note. Be aware that you will have a limited time to complete the module exam. You can only make **ONE** attempt to answer the questions in each exam. and you will be allocated 60 minutes to complete each of these module exams. – remember to **'Save'** the answers before you 'Submit' off the exam. for marking.

The Modules are sequenced in the following order:

Module 1: The Nature of Geography and Maps and Mapmakers

Module 2: Geomorphology – the physical landscape

Module 3: Weather and Climate

Module 4: Population and Cultural Geography

Module 5: Case Studies in Geography

b) Map Quizzes - World Place Locations Mapping:

Please note - this is done using the online workbook -

You will be required to study place locations for the eight major world regions (listed below). There are 10 online Location Quizzes with 15 questions in each quiz (note that - Unit 2 - Europe and Russia and Unit 9 - North America - are both divided into two quizzes each, a cultural quiz and a physical quiz).

Preparation for the quizzes is done by completing the respective chapters in the **World Place Locations online workbook** and referencing an atlas of your choice.

For your convenience you may access the A-Z Maps website which is available to you through the College Library - this is an online atlas and we also recommend that you print off your own blank maps of the regions for revision purposes. We suggest that you follow the link on the website to **download the blank maps** and label all of the required locations on the blank map - this will help you to better remember the locations for the quiz. Preparation for the quizzes is done by completing the respective sections in the **World Place Locations online workbook**, using the blank outline maps – for these go to the College Library site and the blank maps PDFs are all on the Periodicals page:

– all the maps can be printed for revision purposes.

To ensure success, read the **Instructions to the Student** for suggestions, hints, and guidelines in the **World Place Locations online workbook**. So - you fill in the blank maps and they are then used to practice identifying the locations listed in each Chapter of the workbook (you do not hand in these maps as they are only for your practice). The Place Location quizzes are all 'open book' and are in a matching format. Carefully, follow the online instructions when taking the quizzes. You only have **8 minutes** to answer each quiz so please be sure you know the locations well before you begin.

The 10 Map Quizzes and respective Chapters in the World Place Location online workbook are listed below.

Please note - The Major Features of the Planet Map Quiz is at the start of the World Place Location workbook and this is used for practice only – it will not count toward your score for the class – it is only for practice to give you a good idea of what to expect in the Map Quizzes.

Remember - Chapter 1 in your textbook considers the Major Features of the Planet and is not assessed and should be used as a practice map quiz before you begin the other map quizzes. However, it is advised that you plot the locations on a blank world map to allow you to become more familiar with the format of the workbook.

(c) Discussion Topic Postings are an additional part of the course and each of these five postings carries a score of **20 marks** each completed posting **(total - 100 marks)**. **These are submitted using the Discussion Tool on the class Canvas website**

The details of each **Module Discussion Topic** are posted in the Reading and Assignment section in the relevant Module. To contribute to the discussion you will secure a maximum of 20 marks per module discussion toward a total of 100 marks toward your overall score. To secure these marks your first post should discuss the topic under review and should be of approximately 100 words and your response post(s) in which you reflect on other comments by other students should be of about 50-75 words. **the opening class discussion is based on the article 'Columbus's Confession' which is in the Essential Reading section of the textbook and the other four discussions are based on the Case Studies that are all found in the last chapter of the online textbook**

d) The Regional Quiz is done using the online textbook assessment tool. At the end of each of the eight chapters in the textbook you have 25 questions to answer and the 40 questions in the Regional Quiz will be chosen from these 200 questions.

can earn a total of **40 marks** by doing these Regional Quizzes - with 25 marks going to your total score and 15 marks going to extra credit.

Incomplete

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete ("I"). Final Examination Schedule

Withdrawal From Class

Academic Year: College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.

Summer Quarter: College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the fifth week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). After the sixth day and through the end of the fifth week of the quarter, the "W" grade will become part of the student's transcript record.

Hardship Withdrawal (HW)

Students may also contact the Enrollment Services office BEFORE grades are assigned in cases of hardship.
