Course Description

What is deviance and how is it created? How is it maintained? How has it changed over time? What does it have to do with power? Explore deviance as an ever-changing idea in society. Understand the impact social values have on the development of deviance. Themes may include religion, family, sexuality, crime, and/or popular culture.

Course Content

>Chapter Quizzes. 120 points

Administered via CANVAS. Ten (10) True/False Questions per assigned chapter from the Inderbitzen textbook. 1 pt per question.

>Film Analysis Homework. 300 points

Films are a superb way to analyze deviance because they demonstrate the complexities of the social contexts of human behavior. We will watch several films this quarter. Students are required to write a 1-2 page typed analysis (NOT A SUMMARY!), in which you connect the film to our course material.
