Welcome to Geography 123. This is a five-credit course that is crosslisted with International Studies (INTST 123) and it fulfills a Social Science distribution requirement for the Associate in Arts and Sciences (AAS) Degree at Bellevue College. There are no prerequisites for this class.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The phenomenon of globalization involves the exchange and movement of commodities, people, ideas, technologies, currencies, fashions, foods and cultural products. The concept of globalization is also important for understanding the conflicts and problems associated with the natural environment and the ability of the earth's resources to satisfy the increasing demands of a growing population. This course will be divided into five sections each with a specific focus on a particular dimension of globalization. However, it is important to consider that the historical, cultural, economic, environmental and political dimensions of the subject are very closely interrelated.

COURSE OUTCOMES:

After completing this class, students should be able to do the following:

- Define the process of globalization and explain the factors behind the creation of a series of new socioeconomic networks and activities that cross over traditional economic, cultural and geographic boundaries.
- Analyze the regional inequalities in the rate and degrees of globalization.
- Assess the role played by globalization in the diffusion of cultural attributes.
- Evaluate the ways by which globalization is a 'multi-layered process' and the ways by which it effects all parties involved in the exchange process.
- Analyze the relevance played by inter-governmental organizations in fostering or encumbering trade and economic growth and development.

 Critically evaluate the various component parts of globalization and the impact on the environment and the subsequent challenges to humankind.

COURSE GRADING AND ASSIGNMENTS:

READING DISCUSSION POSTS: (50 points total)

- **DESCRIPTION:** Every Wednesday you will have to post answers to a few questions about the weekly reading. The questions are posted directly in the Canvas Readings Discussion Post for that week.
- **SCORING:** This assignment is 5 points per week, and I will allow you to miss or drop one week's post. The rubric for grading is available in the details of each discussion on Canvas.

VIDEO DISCUSSION POSTS: (100 points total)

• DESCRIPTION: Every Friday you will write a discussion post after watching a short video about the course content for that week. The link to the video and the instructions for the post are to be found in the Canvas Video Discussion Post for the week. These videos will generally be 15-20 minute TED talks or at times slightly longer talks by social scientists and scholars who are highly regarded in their fields. These videos will give you an opportunity to see how scholars are addressing the concepts related to globalization, and how such scholars engage with, agree with, disagree with, or criticize other scholars. This will give you familiarity with ongoing debates around globalization. Every Monday, you will have to return to the Video Discussion Post and write a reply to one of the posts from your peers.

 SCORING: This assignment is 10 points per week, and I will allow you to miss or drop one week's post. Similar to the Readings Discussion Post, the rubric for grading these is available in the details of each discussion on Canvas.

DOCUMENTARY CHALLENGES: (50 points total)

- DESCRIPTION: The documentary challenges are longer assignments that require that you watch a documentary about globalization and then complete a specific challenge (e.g. write a short paper, or write a film review). Unlike the weekly posts, these documentary challenges have due dates that give you about a month to complete the assignment. This does not mean that the assignment will take you a month, but these assignments will require an extra bit of research, preparation, and thoughtful analysis.
- **SCORING:** This assignment is 25 points per documentary challenge, and we will have two during the quarter for a total of 50 points.

MIDTERM AND FINAL EXAM: (100 points total)

• **DESCRIPTION:** We will have two exams during the quarter, a midterm and final. The tests will be available on Canvas for 24 hours. However, the test must be completed in one sitting, and you cannot return to the test after you have started it. You need to make sure that you have a solid internet connection during the test, and I recommend that you write and save your answers in a word document while doing the test. You can use any materials you wish during the tests, but you cannot 'cut-n-paste' from any material that

is online (websites, discussion posts, textbooks) or in print. These are online tests that you will have 90 minutes to complete.

• **SCORING:** Each exam is worth 50 points and we will have two during the quarter for a total of 100 points.

ONLINE MODULE FORMAT:

The course material is subdivided into Five Modules:

- Each module is made up of two weeks of material that focuses on the major components of a particular topic related to globalization. You will be tested on this material twice during the quarter. Prepare your notes and organize your course material, because you may use notes on the midterm and final exam.
- Each week includes a combination of readings and videos, which you will comment on in the course discussions. The readings come from our textbook and supplementary materials, and each week you will answer questions based upon the reading material. You will also ask a question that you feel needs to be answered or addressed for you to understand the reading. You will also answer one of the questions of your peers, and I will address some questions that are unanswered or are the most relevant to the course.

- The class includes one midterm and one final exam. You will be allowed to bring study materials to the exams. Before you attempt the exam carefully read and revise through your notes and make sure that you have a thorough understanding of all of the questions from the Readings Discussion Posts.
- Please note that each of the exams will be available for you to take during an 'open period' of 24 hours. This is designed to allow flexibility in the course. However, there will be no make-up opportunities and so I strongly advise you to not leave things until the last moment – just in case you have technical or other difficulties.
