Course Outcomes

This course is a survey of the political, social, and cultural history of the United States during the twentieth century. Upon completion of the course, students will have learned to analyze primary source documents; interrogate historical representations of gender, class, ethnicity, and society; and explain key concepts and events in U.S. history. This course may count as a social science or humanities credit, but not both, at Bellevue College.

How Outcomes will be met

Course outcomes will be met through the following assessments: completing a final research paper; writing about primary source documents; leading and participating in discussions; writing 1 in-class essay and 1 book critique; and completing 2 objective exams.

In-Class Essay = DUE Monday 5/2 = 50 points

In this Blue Book In-Class essay exam, students will answer a specific prompt question about race, gender, and business practices based upon *Hope in a Jar: The Making of America's Beauty Culture* by Kathy Peiss.

Book Critique = DUE Monday 5/30 at 11:59 p.m. on Canvas = 50 points

In this take-home essay, students will write a book critique about a recent historical monograph.

Leading Discussion = 20 points

Students will be assigned a selection from one of the class readings. After emailing their discussion questions to their professor the night before, each student will lead class discussion by asking questions and managing the group's comments.

Discussion Participation = 20 points

Students will be expected to provide insightful commentary during the discussion sessions led by their classmates. 9 discussions will be held in class.

Final Research Paper = 5 Assignments Due Throughout the Quarter = 100 points

Annotated Bibliography = Monday 5/16 at 11:59 p.m. on Canvas = 10 points
