This syllabus provides a general plan for the course; deviations may be necessary.

Course Description	This course covers theories, techniques, and applications of psychological research methodology. Students explore a variety of approaches, ranging from uncontrolled field observation to laboratory experiments. Topics include data analysis, report writing, and factors affecting research results.

Learning Outcomes	 <u>Course Specific</u> - After completing this course, students should be able to: 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the purpose, scope and areas of interest of researchers in psychology and how this relates to the other behavioral sciences. 2. Identify the scientific progress and research methods psychologists and behavioral scientists use in the study of human behavior. 3. Define important research and statistical terms, concepts, and principles used in the study of human behavior. 4. State and develop a specific, investigable problem or issue in psychology. 5. Demonstrate the ability to perform an effective literature search and summarization leading to an operationally definable hypothesis. 6. Design survey instruments, or otherwise design strategies to gather data appropriate to the defined hypothesis. 	



 Identify and compare various research methods and designs used to guide and develop research investigations, to select an appropriate design for the a research project. Perform research investigations at a basic level, using inferential statistical methods, involving at least two factors or variables. Analyze the project methodology and the research of others to identify major flaws, confounding variables, rival hypotheses and threats to validity in the project. Write a concluding report of the study in APA journal style, providing a clear written interpretation of the findings, following standard practices and procedures for organization and illustration. Comprehend and apply ethical principles in the conduct of research.
<u>General Education</u> - BC students experience many opportunities across the curriculum to develop and apply college-wide abilities in preparation for their roles in an increasingly diverse, technologically complex, information-driven society. These abilities include Critical Thinking, Creativity, and Problem Solving, Cultural Diversity, and Nature of Science. Over the course of this class, you will be given the opportunity to practice and hone each of these abilities.
 <u>Chapter Quizzes</u> - You will complete 12 multiple-choice quizzes over the course of the semester (see Course Schedule for dates). Each quiz will cover roughly 1 chapter or 3 days worth of material presented in class and in text. Quizzes are worth up to 25 points each. You cannot make-up missed chapter quizzes for any reason. Instead, I will drop your lowest 2 quiz scores and calculate your final chapter quiz grade out of 10 quizzes. Quizzes will not take the entire class period; I will lecture after. <u>Final Exam</u> - You will complete a cumulative final exam in this course (see Course Schedule for date and time). The final exam is worth up to 100 points and will consist of short answer, matching, multiple-choice, essay and fill-in-the-blank type questions. While the chapter quizzes ensure you read the textbook, the final exam will ensure you understand how to <i>apply</i>, not just recognize and regurgitate course material. Make-up exams may be administered under rare circumstances. If, for extreme illness or some other reason beyond your control, you are unable to be present at the final exam, contact me immediately. With appropriate documentation explaining your absence, you may make-up a missed final exam. Make-up exams must be taken as soon as you are able to return to campus. Literature Search – Article - After we review how to search for peer-reviewed scientific articles using library databases, you will locate one on a topic of your interest in psychology and answer several questions about it. You can earn up to 25 points on this assignment. Articles will be docked 10% points for each day late. For example, if you earn an 87% on this assignment, but submitted it 1 day late, you will receive a 77%.
 collect information from several Bellevue College students. We will compile and analyze survey data in class. More information about this assignment will be presented in class. This assignment is worth up to 25 points. <u>Middlemist et al. (1976) Ethics Essay</u> - The purpose of this assignment is to get you to think critically about ethics in psychological research. To stimulate your critical thinking, you will pretend like you are a member of an Institutional Review Board (IRB) charged with weighing the costs and benefits of the Middlemist et al. (1976) study on



urination and personal space invasions. Your 2-3 page analysis will incorporate the APA Code of Ethics. This assignment is worth up to 100 points. Essays will be docked 10% points for each day late.

<u>Observational Research Report</u> – The purpose of this assignment is to practice operationally defining observable behavior. Your task is to define and then describe a behavior using the observational research design and write up your observations in a brief, 1-pages in length, report. To improve validity and reliability, you will work with a partner to conduct the observation, but will submit your own write-up. More information about this assignment will be presented in class. This assignment is worth up to 100 points.

<u>Participation</u> – You will complete several in-class activities in group and individual format to reinforce material presented in lecture and text. These activities will teach you to apply psychological concepts, theories, and principles to real-world phenomena. Inclass activities cannot be made up for points if you miss class. They serve, in part, to encourage attendance. I will, however, post in-class activities to Canvas so students who miss class can still practice these skills on their own time. You can earn up to 50 points for participation based on the **percentage** of activities completed over the quarter. Points will be assigned on the following scale.

PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES OF THE SOCIAL SCIENCE DIVISION Winter 2013

Cheating, Stealing and Plagiarizing*

Cheating, stealing and plagiarizing (using the ideas or words of another as one's own without crediting the source) and inappropriate/disruptive classroom behavior are violations of the Student Code of Conduct at Bellevue College. Examples of unacceptable behavior include, but are not limited to: talking out of turn, arriving late or leaving early without a valid reason, allowing cell phones/pagers to ring, and inappropriate behavior toward the instructor or classmates. The instructor can refer any violation of the Student Code of Conduct to the Dean of Student Services for possible probation or suspension from Bellevue College. Specific student rights, responsibilities and appeal procedures are listed in the Student Code of Conduct, available in the office of the Dean of Student Services and at http://bellevuecollege.edu/policies/2/2050P_Student_Code_(Procedures).asp

Email Communication with instructors must be done through student email accounts only. Instructors cannot communicate with students about their course work or grades through student's personal email accounts.

Incomplete

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete ("I"). The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade (usually an "F").

F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

The Social Science Division will adhere to the final examination schedule as stated in the BC Schedule. Final examinations will be held at the end of each quarter at fixed times. Instructors will not give examinations in advance of the regular schedule. A student who is absent from any examination held at any time during the quarter may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be present at any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.

Hardship Withdrawal

Instructors may assign the grade of "HW" (hardship withdrawal) at their discretion in the event that a student cannot complete the coursework due to extreme and exceptional circumstances. Students may also contact the Enrollment Services office BEFORE grades are assigned in cases of hardship.

Students Who Require Disability Accommodations:

Students with disabilities who have accommodation needs are encouraged to meet with the Disability Resource Centre (DRC) office located in B132 (telephone 425.564.2498 or TTY 425.564.4110), to establish their eligibility for accommodation. The DRC office will provide each eligible student with an accommodation letter. Students who require accommodation in class should review the DRC accommodation letter with each instructor during the first week of the quarter.

Students with mobility challenges who may need assistance in case of an emergency situation or evacuation should register with Disability Resource Centre, and review those needs with the instructor as well.

Distribution of Grades

Grades will not be posted in the Social Science Division or in faculty offices, and program assistants or coordinators will not give out grades. Students should access their grades through the BC Web site.

Return of Papers and Tests

Paper and/or Scantron score sheet returns will be arranged in the following ways ONLY: by mail, if student supplies the instructor with stamped, self-addressed envelope (with appropriate postage); or by the instructor designating a time and place whereby the student may retrieve his/her papers. Unclaimed papers and/or Scantron score sheets must be kept by the instructor for a minimum of sixty (60) instructional days following the end of the quarter.

*If you are accused of cheating, stealing exams and/or plagiarism, there is a Bellevue College Student Discipline and Appeals Procedure (the right to due process), which you may pursue. Contact the office of Division Chair (D110), the Dean of Student Services (B231A) or the Associated Student Body (C212) for information regarding the appeals process.
