Course Description:

The course is designed to make students aware that the objective of Criminology is the development of a body of general and verified principles and of other types of knowledge regarding the process of law, crime, and treatment or prevention. These bodies of knowledge are constructed from study and analysis conducted in accordance with the scientific principles of research methodology.

Learners will be able to:

- 1 The first part of the course will be dedicated to understanding what criminology is and how it came to be something that we study.
- 2 Second, we will examine all of the major theories in criminology. These theories explain crime as a social phenomena and individual criminal behavior in many different ways. Some theories explain criminal behavior as a deficiency in the individual, while others explain that crime occurs because of inadequacies within society.
- 3 The course will end with a more applied approach to study of crime. We will discuss different types of crime, and how these types can be explained using our theories from the previous section.
- 4 We will study various serial killers through video, discussion, and other sources. By looking at the criminological theories and applying if these theories give us any insight into serial killers lives/minds/background.

At the end of the course, you should have a good understanding of crime and criminology. This knowledge will enable you to view the relevant issues surrounding the question of criminal behavior from

more than one perspective.

Assignments

All written assignments need to be completed in a standard APA or MLA format. **Be sure to cite all sources, even if only the textbook is used**. For information on how to write academic papers and for standard source citations see http://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/.

Assignments

- Serial Killer Friday: Weekly 15-point assignments. Submit via canvas
- You will watch a video on a serial killer every week and then answers questions relevant to identifying MO, criminal procedure and theory. This is an application of the material we are studying this quarter and in other CJ course. It also gives you a taste of what criminal psychological profiling is like.
- Due the next Sunday at 11:59 PM (before the start of the module week).
- These are short essays 1.5-3 pages (not counting a resources page), and no cover page is required. The paper must be typed in 12-point font (Times New Roman). Be sure to cite all resources, including the video, text, outside source, etc.
- Weekly 10-point discussion posts.
- Since this course is online, this is the primary means of communication between students and to demonstrate to the instructor that you are thinking about and applying topic concepts of the class.
- You will be required to post your own opinion first and then respond to at least <u>TWO (2)</u> other classmates. Each weekly post counts as 10 points toward participation. All of your posts will be due the Sunday of the week assigned.
- These are to be written in complete sentences and are not to be treated like text messages. Always use the utmost courtesy and appropriate etiquette in your communications. Be sure to cite any sources used, including the textbook.
- Weekly multiple-choice quizzes.

These quizzes are directly from the text and weekly modules. You will have 50 minutes to complete each quiz. The quiz must be completed in one sitting and must be done by midnight Sunday of the assigned week. Quizzes are worth between 30 pts. and 35 pts.

Short writing assignments 15 pts each

There will be three relatively short 2.5-4 page writing assignments throughout the quarter. These assignments are to be done in essay format and conform to APA or MLA format. Be sure to cite all sources used.

• Final Research Paper 100 points. Submit via canvas

- For this paper, you will choose a theory discussed during the quarter and apply it to any crime of your choosing, except serial killing (spree and mass murder are okay). You may illustrate or use a case example, examine a character from a movie, or discuss the application theoretically. If you use a case study be sure to include a link or the case study along with the paper. If you are going to use a movie please discuss it with me first! (Good examples of movies to look at for example: The Boiler Room, Crash, Maria Full of Grace, Pulp Fiction, American History X, etc.)
- This is an academic research paper. It should be at least 5 pages in length (cover page and reference page do not count), The paper must be typed in 12 point font (Times New Roman), 1 inch margins, and
- MUST have a cover page and references page in APA or MLA documentation style (no abstract is needed, but list all references).
- You <u>may not use</u> Wikipedia as a reference since it is not peer reviewed (see me for all sources that you are unsure about using). You must have at least 2 peer-reviewed references.
- The paper is the last day of class. NO LATE PAPERS WILL BE ACCEPTED!!!
- Plagiarism will result in a 0 grade for the course and may have potential academic discipline beyond the scope of the course.

Expectations & Information

Attendance: All students are expected to attend the class daily, as well as study for an average of 1-2 hours per hour of class time. Obviously, if students do not attend the classroom regularly and study, the opportunity to perform well in this course is greatly diminished.

<u>Course Requirements</u>: All students are expected to read the required chapters of the textbook as outlined online and in the schedule section of this syllabus. Students are also expected to read the required chapters to attend the online classroom regularly, finish online requirements, take notes, ask questions, and participate in online discussions.

Make-up Policy: Any make-up tests are allowed only at the discretion of the instructor and immediate notification from the student is imperative. Additionally, all make-up exams (for any unexcused circumstance) will adhere to the following criteria: 1) administered only by the instructor during office hours/or instructor's choosing; 2) cumulative in nature; and 3) given in all-essay format. Incomplete:

F Grade:

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule:
