### Course Description

Welcome to the Psychology 100 class! The field of psychology is defined as a “scientific study of behavior and mental processes”, and you will learn that psychologists study a remarkably wide range of topics. Examples of topics we’ll talk about include sleep and dreaming, psychological disorders and therapies, memory and how people form false memories, how people learn, why people obey orders even when obeying makes them hurt someone, and what makes people more or less likely to help others. You’ll also learn about the history of psychology, how psychologists conduct research, and how children and adolescents develop. We will also talk a lot about the brain. The purpose of the course is to introduce you to the major concepts, theories and research findings in psychology. **Please read this entire syllabus as it contains a lot of important information regarding the class!** If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me as soon as possible.

**IMPORTANT:** I will be posting class material and documents such as the syllabus, announcements, assignments and links to films on the MyBC Class Site. You need to create a BC student network account (at <https://bellevuecollege.edu/sam>) before you can log in to MyBC and access the Class site. The student network account may be created any time after you receive your student identification number (SID) and personal identification number (PIN). For students enrolled in credit classes, the SID and PIN are issued after you apply for admissions. For students enrolled in classes through BC Continuing Education, the SID and PIN are established after you register for a class. Continuing Education students may contact the Continuing Education office directly to request this identification information. ## **Course Purpose & Goals**

### **COURSE OUTCOMES**

1. Describe the purpose, comprehensive scope, and areas of application in the discipline of psychology.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of the scientific process by applying and/or critiquing various research methods used by psychologists in the study of behavior.
3. Recognize, compare and contrast various theoretical perspectives used to explain and guide psychological research and application.
4. Identify historical and present-day contributions of major psychologists.
5. Define important psychological terms, concepts, processes and principles.
6. Apply critical thinking to assumptions, claims, and common sense ideas about behavior.
7. Demonstrate the application of psychological principles and findings to one's own life.

### **STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES**

In terms of general education outcomes, students will be able to:

Use cognitive and creative skills:

- a) Analyzing (identifying and evaluating problems)
- b) Synthesizing (interpreting situations, drawing conclusions, and making connections)

Improve communication skills:

- a) Doing research (gathering and documenting information)
- b) Delivering one or more written, oral and/or visual presentation with formal documentation

## **Student Exams & Activities (450 points total)**

- 1) Exams (200 points): There will be 5 exams, each worth 50 points. Your lowest exam score will be dropped and 4 exams will count towards the final grade. The exams consist of multiple choice and short-answer questions, and may include extra credit opportunities. No scantrons are needed, but you **should bring your own paper for answers to essay questions!** The first four exams are non-cumulative, and the final exam is cumulative. If you are happy with the first four exam scores, you may drop the final exam. You have an opportunity to resubmit a total of TWO short-essay answers during the quarter for reconsideration up to one week after the exam. This opportunity is only available for the first three exams. The corrected short answers must be emailed to me and they must be your own original work, not copied from anywhere. More information about this will be provided in class. **No make-up exams will be given. Since your lowest score will be dropped, if you miss an exam, the missed exam will be accepted as your lowest score.** However, please contact me for exceptional circumstances such as illness or death in the family. Documentation such as a doctor's note or a death certificate may be required.
- 2) Quizzes (60 points): There will be 3 quizzes, each worth 20 points. The quizzes may include multiple choice and short-answer questions, they are non-cumulative and are given at the beginning of the class on pre-assigned days (please see the course schedule). No scantrons are needed. No make-up quizzes

will be given.

- 3) Article Assignment (40 points): You will be given real scientific research articles to read. You will pick two articles and answer questions about them, and submit your answers to me in writing. You can earn up to 40 points for this assignment. Late assignments without a documented reason may lead to a 50% reduction in points, and if the assignment is significantly late, it may not be accepted for grading.
- 4) Short Assignments (80 points): These assignments include 4 film assignments (viewing a film and answering questions about it in writing), 3 Exam Question assignments (submitting exam questions and answers to me, some of which I will include in the actual exams), and a Historical Psychology Person assignment. Each assignment is worth 10 points.
- 5) Attendance (70 points): I will randomly check attendance on at least 10 days of the quarter (attendance will not be taken on exam days). You get 10 points for being present on a given day when attendance is recorded. Thus, to get full credit (70 points) for attendance, you need to be present on 7 of these days. If you collect an 8<sup>th</sup> attendance recording, you get 10 extra credit points! This policy is designed to encourage regular attendance, and to reward students who come to class.

**Extra Credit:** Tests and assignments include extra credit opportunities at random.

### **Grading Information**

The total number of points you earn will be converted to a percentage of the total points possible. Your final grade will be assigned based on the letter grade scale as shown below:

For example, if you earn 360 points out of the total possible 450 points, your points are divided by the total possible points to obtain a percentage of the total points ( $360/450 = 0.80 = 80\%$ ). Once you have the percentage, refer to the table above to figure out the grade ( $80\% = B$ ).

**Missing Class:** It is your responsibility to find out from other students what you have missed when you are absent. ## **PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES OF THE SOCIAL SCIENCE DIVISION**

### **Cheating, Stealing and Plagiarizing\***

Cheating, stealing and plagiarizing (using the ideas or words of another as one's own without crediting the source) and inappropriate/disruptive classroom behavior are violations of the Student Code of Conduct at Bellevue College. Examples of unacceptable behavior include, but are not limited to: talking out of turn, arriving late or leaving early without a valid reason, allowing cell phones/pagers to ring, and inappropriate behavior toward the instructor or classmates. The instructor can refer any violation of the Student Code of Conduct to the Dean of Student Services for possible probation or suspension from Bellevue College. Specific student rights, responsibilities and appeal procedures are listed in the Student Code of Conduct, available in the office of the Dean of Student Services.

### Incomplete

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete ("I"). The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade (usually an "F").

### F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

### Final Examination Schedule

The Social Science Division will adhere to the final examination schedule as stated in the BC Schedule. Final examinations will be held at the end of each quarter at fixed times. Instructors will not give examinations in advance of the regular schedule. A student who is absent from any examination held at any time during the quarter may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be present at any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

### Withdrawal From Class

College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.

### Hardship Withdrawal

Instructors may assign the grade of "HW" (hardship withdrawal) at their discretion in the event that a student cannot complete the coursework due to extreme and exceptional circumstances. Students may also contact the Enrollment Services office BEFORE grades are assigned in cases of hardship.

### Students Who Require Disability Accommodations:

Students with disabilities who have accommodation needs are encouraged to meet with the Disability Resource Centre (DRC) office located in B132 (telephone 425.564.2498 or TTY 425.564.4110), to establish their eligibility for accommodation. The DRC office will provide each eligible student with an accommodation letter. Students who require accommodation in class should review the DRC accommodation letter with each instructor during the first week of the quarter.

Students with mobility challenges who may need assistance in case of an emergency situation or evacuation should register with Disability Resource Centre, and review those needs with the instructor as well.

### Distribution of Grades

Grades will not be posted in the Social Science Division or in faculty offices, and secretaries will not give out grades. Students should access their grades through the BC Web site.

### Return of Papers and Tests

Paper and/or Scantron score sheet returns will be arranged in the following ways ONLY: by mail, if student supplies the instructor with stamped, self-addressed envelope (with appropriate postage); or by the instructor designating a time and place whereby the student may retrieve his/her papers. Unclaimed papers and/or Scantron score sheets must be kept by the instructor for a minimum of sixty (60) instructional days following the end of the quarter.

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*\*If you are accused of cheating, stealing exams and/or plagiarism, there is a Bellevue College Student Discipline and Appeals Procedure (the right to due process) which you may pursue.
