Course Description and Goals

This course will focus on issues of deviance and crime from a sociological perspective including what is considered deviant and by whom, types of deviants, etc. and topics such as drug use, sexuality, and the criminal justice system. Critical thinking and discussion will be important components of the course.

Course Outcomes

After completing this course, successful students should be able to:

- Apply basic sociological concepts and ideas to the idea of deviance;
- Discuss the role of power in defining “deviance”;
- Question the idea of a “polite society” or the “status quo” in relation to control and power;
- Describe how changes in society impact who and what is and is not considered deviant; and
- Explain the role of race, class, gender, and sexuality in the construction of deviance.

Required Text and Readings

No textbook is required for this class. All readings for the course will be available through our Canvas course in the Files tab (in the Readings folder).

Attendance

Attendance is **required**. Students are allowed to miss TWO class periods without documentation. All other absences must be excused absences; please review the Bellevue College Student Rules on excused absences. More than two undocumented absences will result in a reduction of your overall grade, taken from your overall participation score for the course in direct proportion to the number of classes missed. If you miss zero to two classes, you will not be penalized. If you miss over one-third of classes, a further 1/3 letter grade deduction will be taken out of your grade. Notecards will be used to keep track of attendance (see course requirements).

Classroom Policies

Please silence cell phones before the beginning of class. Students whose cell phones ring in class or who I see using their mobile devices will receive no points for that day's class participation. Students are permitted to use computers to take notes if they wish. However, note taking is the **only** activity allowed during class. If any students engage in other activities on their computers during class meetings they will receive a zero for that day's class participation after one warning.

As this is a college course, this classroom shall be treated as a professional environment. I expect everyone to be respectful of others. There will be zero tolerance for disrespect including but not limited to racism, sexism, ageism, ableism, and heterosexism.

Course Requirements

Notecards

(180 points total, 15 points each)

For each reading, you will be required to submit a notecard with a summary of the main points and important concepts from the reading due for that day (a template will be available on Canvas and discussed in class). If there are multiple readings, a separate notecard is required for each reading and you must write on all readings assigned on a given day. Both sides may be used and you may submit up to two notecards (fastened together) for a single reading. This notecard (3x5 or 4x6 size) is due at the beginning of class each day. Late notecards (not turned in at the start of class and missing due to unapproved absences) will not be accepted.

While you are required to turn in a card everyday, only 13 of them will be randomly graded. Your lowest scored notecard will be dropped. You will be notified at the beginning of class that your notecards will be graded that day. **You can use your notecards (and only your notecards) on your exams**—so spending some time now defining key terms, identifying major themes, and providing examples for yourself will help you when the exam comes. The assignment sheet for these notecards is available on Canvas.

Quizzes

(140 points total, 20 points each)

Quizzes will take place at the end of each week during the quarter and cover the material from that week. They will be multiple choice in format. No makeup or late quizzes will be accepted unless there is a BC approved absence. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Notecard Worksheet

(20 points total)

A worksheet will be provided to you on the first day of the quarter. Follow the directions for the worksheet and submit by the due date.

Short Assignments (Shorty)

(160 points total, 20 points each)

Nine times throughout the quarter, a short assignment will be given in class, to be turned in at the start of the following class period. Details will be given in class. These assignments must be typed and printed out for submission. The lowest Shorty will be dropped.

Breach Experiment and Paper

(100 points total)

Each student will be required to complete a breach experiment in which they defy some norm and capture the action and reaction to the breach on video. Students will be required to have the experiment filmed in secret. The complete assignment will include the film (edited or not, but under 2 minutes in length) along with a paper. Further details will be available on Canvas.

Media Presentation and Paper

(100 points total)

Beginning in week two, we will start class with music selections or television or movie clips brought in by students. The media you bring should deal with some aspect of deviance. Students will make a 7-10 minute presentation about their chosen media. Students should be prepared to discuss what messages this media has, to evaluate those messages, and discuss the sociological implications of it; often the sociological connection requires a separate discussion after the lyrics/clip has been presented. Specifically, the discussion should connect the media to the course materials including theories of deviance. For more information about this assignment, view the assignment sheet in Canvas.

Exams

(200 points total, 100 points each)

There will be two exams in this course, a midterm and a final. Each exam is worth 100 points. The exams will be composed of multiple choice questions and potential short essay questions. However, there will be no scantron or bluebook needed. You may use your notecards (see above) on the exam.

Attendance and Participation

(100 points total: 50 for attendance, 25 for participation, 25 for midterm check-in meeting)

Participation includes answering questions when called upon, participating in discussions, and asking insightful and engaging questions related to course material. Active participation will help a borderline final grade. During weeks 5-7 of the course, you are required to set up a meeting with Dr. Lê during her office hours. Use the code from the first page of the syllabus or go to drle.youcanbook.me to schedule it. These informal, low-pressure meetings will be up to 10 minutes in length.

Please keep in mind that you are expected to keep up with the readings through the term. All students are expected to have read the assigned material **before** each class meeting. Attendance is always helpful (and required) to get a better understanding of the material. Please note that a few points can make a difference. I want you to do your very best in this course, and I will help all students as much as I can.

Extra Credit

There may be opportunities for extra credit throughout the quarter. These opportunities are generally events on campus, which involve a lecture, documentary showing, debate, or a cultural event with an educational component. The requirements for the reflection paper are on Canvas. The papers will be due by 11:59pm one week after the event. Additionally, video links will be posted in the Canvas assignment link. These videos may be watched and analyzed similar to the events. Video link extra credit papers will be due by 11:59pm on the last regular course day. Students may complete TWO total of these extra credit opportunities for a possible 15 points each or 30 points total. These extra points are added onto a student's total points for the course. No late work will be accepted without a pre-approved reason. Please view the full assignment sheet on Canvas.

Late Policy

Exams

All missed exams must be pre-approved by the instructor **PRIOR** to the due date. Make-up exams will be given at the discretion of the instructor and must occur **before** the due date. Missed exams without prior approval can only be made up if the absence accompanies an approved excuse and if immediate notice is given to the instructor via email or phone.

Assignments

Any missed assignments not pre-approved by the instructor must accompany an approved excuse in order for an extended due date to be given.

Unapproved absences will result in zeros on assignments and exams and **cannot** be made up. Approved absences include school-sponsored event participation, hospitalization, childbirth, major accident or injury, or bereavement. It is the student's responsibility to provide the instructor appropriate documentation within a reasonable timeframe. The only exceptions to this policy are late papers, which will receive a 10% deduction per day late, or presentations, which will receive a 10% deduction per day late if class days remain.
