Course Catalog Description

What makes you, you? Are you free to choose your own destiny, or does society determine your path? Explore how our different identities impact our everyday lived experiences and develop useful ways to think about the world around you. Themes include power dynamics, culture, identities, deviance, stereotyping, and/or the social construction of knowledge.

Course Content

Sociologists study a broad range of topics--some of which includes provocative content and adult themes. While every attempt will be made to keep things PG-13, please know that there will be times where R-rated content (language, images, etc.) is necessary to examine course topics within an academic context. Students will not be penalized for excusing themselves from content they find objectionable or difficult to watch, see, discuss or listen to. That being said, students who excuse themselves are responsible for any course material they miss as a result of choosing not to participate. If you have any questions or concerns about course content or classroom climate, feel free to speak with me about it at any time. I am not punitive, I am here to support you. Classroom Theme/Pedagogical Approach

Video selections and music will be prominently featured in this class and will be used to illustrate course topics and themes. All multimedia selections are chosen for their ability to make you think and therefore, inspire engaging classroom conversations. No one will be put on the spot, but please be prepared to participate in class discussions. Critical thinking is the goal.

This course is paperless and uses many different online, internet based tools to support classroom management and enhance student learning. Students in this section of SOC 101 will need to have stable and consistent internet access along with a working Bellevue College email account (^see notes below for access information).

General Rules and Expectations

- Come to class. Every day. Be on time. Be present (e.g. awake).
- Complete the readings no later than the start of the week assigned.
- Be prepared to contribute to the in-class conversations.
- Take notes on the readings, videos, and songs.

Learning Outcomes:

After completing this class, students should be able to:

Identify and demonstrate an understanding of basic concepts most widely used in sociology today, such as the sociological imagination, social and institutional norms, ethnocentrism and cultural relativism, perspectives on social order and conflict, and/or social stratification;

Describe some of the “classics” in sociology and explain the shift within sociology toward cultural studies;

Critically examine the social landscape in which you live and understand how groups, communities, and institutions impact individual lives;

Identify the ways in which culture and social institutions (such as education, economy, media, family) shape our everyday experiences; and

Explain social constructionism and how life experiences and opportunities differ according to race, class, gender, and sexuality.

Course Requirements:

- **Participation.** (500pts)

TOP HAT will be used in the classrooms to take attendance, comment in group discussions, and take chapter quizzes. Due dates vary.

- **LearnSmart Readings.** (1600 points)

Our core textbook, SOC 2016, is a fully integrated eBook. Students are required to complete each chapter reading by the stated due dates.

- **CONNECT(tm) Assignments.** (1700pts)

SOC 2016, also features interactive online activities. Students will have a variety of online assignments for each chapter. Due dates and points per assignment will vary.

- **“The Absolutely True Diary of a Part Time Indian”** (1000pts)

We will be using this Sherman Alexie novel to apply Sociology concepts and terms from SOC 2016. A choice of submission formats will be available. More details via handout. Due: December 1st.

- **Final Examination** (200pts)

One hundred (100) multiple choice questions. 2 points per question. Please bring a Scantron form and pencil on your scheduled exam day.
