POLS 220 INTRODUCTION TO LAW Fall Quarter 2009

recommends a legal dictionary but it is not required.

COURSE SUMMARY AND OBJECTIVE

The major objectives will be to introduce the nature of law and the resolution of disputes in the court system.

COURSE GRADING CRITERIA

To receive a passing grade in this course, students must complete all of the assignments and exams. Students must submit the assignments on the due dates. The instructor will grade each student individually on a possible total score of 200 points, which is structured as follows:

- 1. <u>Exams (150 points):</u> These two tests will be a combination of true/false, short answers, multiple choice, and essays. The exams are based on all of the assigned reading material regardless of whether or not we discuss the material in class. Tests may also cover handouts, material presented in class including but not limited to, lectures, videos, and guest lecturers. There will be no makeup exams.
 - a. Midterm 1 (50 points)
 - b. Midterm 2 (50 points)
 - c. Final Exam (50 points)
- **Case Analysis Paper (50 points):** For the topic of this paper, students must select a significant and/or controversial United States Supreme Court case. If students are having any trouble deciding on a case, then I will provide a list of suggested cases. I must approve the case selected by the student. The essay must be a minimum of five (5) pages, typewritten, double spaced, and written in accordance with a required format which I will provide in class to the students. The student's objective on this paper

is to explain the facts of the case, the positions of the parties and the reasoning of the court while communicating the student's informed opinion regarding the decision. Due date is in the course outline We will be using turnitin.com to help avoid any issues of plagiarism.

Class participation: In addition to the above-referenced grading criteria, the instructor does take into account the <u>degree and quality</u> of your class participation when he determines the final grades. If, for example, your final grade is on the borderline between a B and an A, your class participation may persuade me to give you the A if you have shown that you have made attempts to consistently participate in the class. Thus, class participation can only help your grade and it is highly recommended.

COURSE RULES

- 1. Class lectures are kept informal to facilitate discussion. Students should conduct their side conversations very quietly, they should keep those conversations to a minimum, and they should be related to the topic being discussed in class.
- 2. Students are expected to do their own work. Cheating of any type is prohibited and students who fail to comply with this requirement may be denied credit for the course.
