Course Information

Please note that this is an online course. You are expected to spend at least 5 hours per week on REVEL and Canvas assignments.

Description

In this course, we will examine research and theories regarding human growth and change from prenatal development to late adulthood. We will explore many factors that affect psychosocial, cognitive, and physical development from varied perspectives along the way. Students will engage with the course content through a variety of learning experiences, including REVEL quizzes and shared writing prompts, online discussions, videos, and exams.

The goals of this course can be lumped into two broad categories: content and process. Content goals involve conveying information. There are theories, psychologists, facts, terms, and studies that you will need to learn for the exams. Process goals involve learning new perspectives from which to consider and evaluate information. These process goals are just as important as content goals (if not more so), but harder to measure. I hope that, after taking this class, you will ask yourself and others questions about biological, cognitive, and sociocultural factors affecting human development that you might not have otherwise. As B. F. Skinner put it, "Education is what survives when what has been learned has been forgotten," (1964).

Course Content

This course will involve some potentially provocative material framed within an academic context. Keep in mind that finding oneself in a space outside of one's comfort zone is an opportunity for learning. Students may be confronted with difficult material in this course. If you have any questions or concerns about course content or online climate, please speak with me immediately.

Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Compare and contrast stage theory and transition theory, discussing continuity, stability, and chronology issues.
- Identify descriptive, correlational and experimental designs and relate them to the unique challenges of developmental research.
- Describe the interactions of genetics and environmental influences at each stage of the lifespan.
- Compare and contrast the cognitive theory of Jean Piaget with the information processing theories of cognitive development.
- Compare and contrast the psychosocial theory of Erik Erikson with the psychosexual theory of Freud.
- Articulate the prenatal health issues and birthing options as influences on prenatal development.
- Apply knowledge of cross-cultural research to developmental differences across the lifespan.
- Articulate common issues and perspectives for each life stage in order to communicate effectively across the lifespan.

Required Course Materials

You are required to purchase the **REVEL version of Arnett, Human Development: A Cultural Approach, 2e** for this course. I will assign reading, writing, and quizzes in REVEL – in total, these assignments are worth 20% of your grade.

While access to REVEL is required, the printed version of this text is optional. There are copies on reserve available for short-term loan at the Library Media Center.

There are two ways to purchase REVEL access. Choose the option that works best for you:

Course Format

The course will be comprised of 4 units. For each unit, students will complete associated REVEL assignments and unit objectives, take an exam on Canvas, and complete in-class participation exercises.

- There will be opportunities to earn extra credit through several in-class activities throughout the quarter. These will not be announced ahead of time and cannot be made up for any reason. There will be NO extra credit assignments offered at the end of the quarter.

Syllabus Quiz (5pts)

You should always consult the syllabus first when you have a question about the class. Chances are, an associated policy is outlined here, and I strictly adhere to my policies. To make sure you have read and understand the policies for this course, you will take a 10-question syllabus review quiz located on the Canvas website under Quizzes.

REVEL Assignments (100pts)

Students will complete chapter quizzes and short writing prompts on the REVEL course website. Each chapter quiz contains up to 15 multiple choice questions and is available to retake as many times as needed to obtain a perfect score before the due date (and time). **REVEL assignments cannot be made up for** <u>*any*</u> **reason beyond the due date, so do these early and as often as needed to obtain a perfect score!**

At the end of the quarter, points earned on REVEL assignments will be entered into the Canvas gradebook as a score out of 100 points. Percentages will be rounded to the nearest whole number. For example, if you earned 78.5% of the total points assigned on REVEL, you will receive 79/100 in Canvas. If you have a 78.49% on REVEL, you will receive 78/100 in Canvas.

Unit Objectives (4 @ 30pts)

On Canvas, under Files, you will find the course files organized by unit with chapter Powerpoint presentations and accompanying objectives.

For each of the four units, you will need to complete and submit your completed objectives either through Canvas or in class for 30 points towards your course grade. These cannot be turned in late without medical or legal documentation.

Unit Exams (best 3/4 @ 60pts)

Each unit will culminate in a Canvas exam. These exams consist of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. These exams will be due on the dates noted in the course schedule at the end of this syllabus. You will have 60 minutes to complete the exam once you begin.

NOTE: Copying and pasting from the internet will not earn you any credit in this course. Put information in your own words. If you have your objectives completed in your own words, you'll have no trouble finishing the exams in time.

Canvas Discussion Board Posts (4 @ 5pts)

It is essential to engage with the material to thoroughly understand and apply the material of the course. Once during each unit (preferably *while* you are reading and taking REVEL quizzes), you will post a question for your classmates to respond to. In your post, you must refer a specific section in the text and do one of the following: 1) ask for clarification on or examples of a certain passage or concept, 2) ask for feedback on one of your chapter objectives or a chapter quiz question you are having trouble with, or 3) ask for more scholarly information on a certain passage or concept. Please ask as many questions as you need to succeed in the unit on this discussion board. You will only earn credit for the first, but *please* ask additional questions here.

Canvas Discussion Board Responses (7@ 10pts)

You are responsible for answering or following up on 7 questions posted on the discussion board throughout the quarter (2 required responses for unit 1-3, 1 response in unit 4). If you would like to answer an 8th question, you will receive up to 10pts extra credit.

Full credit responses will do the following:

- Address the poster and question you are responding to respectfully (2pts)
- Contribute significantly to the thread by doing at least one of the following: provide an answer to the question citing the text, further the discussion on the question, provide thoughtful feedback, or provide a summary of scholarly information on the passage or concept (4pts)
- Use correct grammar, punctuation, and spelling to express ideas clearly (4pts)

Proof of Evaluation Completion

In the ninth week of the quarter, you will receive begin receiving invitations to the course evaluation. You will need to complete this for 5 points towards your final course grade. Please upload a screenshot or picture of the completion screen or your verification email to Canvas before the due date.

Late Policy

Remember, assignments cannot be made up without documentation for any reason.

Make Up Exams

Incomplete

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete ("I").
