Course Description

Introduction to African American Studies uses an interdisciplinary, multimedia approach to examine the history, culture, religions, institutions, politics, economics, and arts of peoples of African decent in the United States. Focus is on U.S. life from a Black perspective, examining both historical and contemporary works.

Attendance is mandatory, unless previously excused. Each student will be expected to keep pace with the required reading assignments and to partake rigorously in all class room discussion. Reading assignments should be completed and students prepared for classroom discussion on the day that the reading assignment is due.

Each student will be required to submit one page, typed double spaced, self assessment at the end of class each Friday which addresses what you have learned from the class and what you have contributed to the class that week. There will be a total of ten self assessments for the quarter. These responses will contribute to the class participation grade.

Each student will participate in group research project which will be presented to the class.

This group presentation will contribute 20% to the class participation portion of the final class grade.

In addition each student will write three (3) 2 1/2-3 page essays spaced throughout the quarter. Assignments will be discussed in class prior to the date due. These essays will count as a total of 60% of the final class grade; 20% for each essay.

Grading

The formal essays will count for 60% of the final grade.

Class participation and group presentation will count for 40% of the final grade.
