Psyc& 100 On-line Summer Quarter

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Psychology 100 is an introductory survey course designed to introduce students to the major concepts, theories, and research findings in the field of psychology. Through reading, lectures, discussion, and assignments, students will be exposed to the wide range of research issues addressed by psychologists, and hopefully will gain an appreciation of the importance of psychological research in its application to human life.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be

Describe the purpose, scope, and applications of the field of psychology Demonstrate knowledge of basic scientific principles by applying research methods used by psychologists.

Recognize, compare and contrast varying theoretical perspective used to explain psychological phenomenon.

Identify the historical and present-day contributions of major psychologist. Define important psychological terms, concepts, processes and principles. Apply critical thinking to "commonsense" ideas and unsubstantiated claims. Apply to one's own life some of the findings and principles described by psychologists.

REQUIREMENTS

WEEKLY DISCUSSION FORUM

The discussion forum is the heart of the course. Students will be responding to my questions, responding to other students, and asking questions of their own, just as they would in a "live" discussion. The discussion sessions will run from Monday to Friday every week (except the last week, which will run Monday-Wednesday). Specifically, you are expected to participate in the discussion at least three times a week. See the "Course Structure and Expectations" for more details on how the discussion will work. The grade for this portion of the class will be a combination of points for participating (20 points for each discussion) and points for the quality of participation (25 points to be assigned at the end of the quarter).

QUIZZES

There will be 6 weekly quizzes given on-line at the beginning of each week. Quizzes will be based on the assigned reading, the weekly overview, and the discussions from the previous week. Each quiz will have 40 multiple choice questions, to be answered on-line in a limited time period. Quizzes will be available to take from Sunday at 8 a.m. until Monday at 11 p.m. Once you open the quiz, you will have 40 minutes to complete it. Quiz scores will be doubled at the end of the quarter.

PSYCH-ONLINE ACTIVITIES

Each week you will also be asked to select 3 interactive activities from "Psych Online," a web-based resource that accompanies the text. You will be able to select any appropriate activities related to that week's reading that interests you, including tutorials, critical thinking activities, and simulated demonstrations. To earn credit, you will need to write a brief 3-paragraph summary of what you did and what you learned from each activity and post it in the unit by Thursday of each week. Psych Online write-ups will be worth up to 15 points per week. Criteria will be published for how points are assigned. VIDEO ASSIGNMENTS

Each week, you will be asked to view between four and six video clips from the Video Tool Kit related to the week's material. To complete the assignment, you will be asked to write a response to several questions related to the video. Each assignment will be worth up to 20 points per week.

FINAL EXAM

A comprehensive final exam will be given on-line the last day of the quarter (Wednesday). This exam will have 100 multiple-choice and matching questions and will include questions on the last unit as well as from he entire quarter. GRADING:

Grades will be determined on he basis of points earned, rather than on a curve. Possible points for each part of the class are as follows:

Cheating, Stealing and Plagiarizing*

"Cheating, stealing and plagiarizing (using the ideas or words of another as one's own without crediting the source) and inappropriate/disruptive classroom behavior are violations of the Student Code of Conduct at Bellevue Community College. If a student fails to complete the majority of the work for a course due to unforeseen circumstances, an instructor may or may not assign the grade of Incomplete (I). The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade (usually an "F"). F Grade*

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

The Social Science Division will adhere to the final examination schedule as stated in the BCC Schedule. Final examinations will be held at the end of each quarter at fixed times. Instructors will not give examinations in advance of the regular schedule. A student who is absent from any examination held at any time during the quarter may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be present at any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the date posted in the quarterly schedule. If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course. Hardship Withdrawal

Instructors may assign the grade of "HW" (hardship withdrawal) at their discretion in the event that a student cannot complete the coursework due to extreme and exceptional circumstances. Students may also contact the Enrollment Services office BEFORE grades are assigned in cases of hardship. Disabled Students
