The second component looks at maps and mapping techniques. The third and fourth sections investigate the earth science and culture-environment traditions. A workbook, atlas, and videos introduce regions and locations to the students.

How to calculate your end of quarter quiz grade.

Drop your lowest score and add up all your points. Let's say you received a total of 215. Then take your accumulated 215 points and divide by the total points counted 250. The last step, you multiply by 100 to convert to a percentage.

EXAMPLE: $215/250 = 0.86 \times 100 = 86\%$.
