#### **Course Description:**

Welcome to the General Psychology class!

Psychology is the scientific study of mind and behavior, and psychologists use a variety of methodologies with the shared objective of *understanding*, *explaining*, and *predicting* human experiences. Students will leave this course with a better understanding of behavior with the knowledge and critical thinking skills that they need to begin explaining and predicting behavior in their own lives. Students will also leave this course appreciating psychology as both an empirical and applied science. You'll also learn about the history of psychology, how psychologists conduct research, and how children and adolescents develop. We will also talk a lot about the brain and its role in our behavior. The purpose of the course is to introduce you to the major concepts, theories and research findings in psychology.

Please read this entire syllabus as it contains a lot of important information regarding the class.

This might be one of your first college classes. College works quite differently from high school. There is less structure, limited time and guidance, and a lot more is expected from you. **YOU are responsible for keeping yourself on schedule, knowing the due dates, and planning ahead.** Regularly study concepts you don't understand, and ask for help right away if you need it.

#### Learning Atmosphere:

Research into learning shows that you can learn most effectively when you engage in the material, apply the concepts to your daily life in addition to past experiences, and even have a bit of fun with it. To that end, the atmosphere that I try to create in the classroom is one of mutual respect, engagement, activity, and fun. This class will have the typical lecture components that you may expect in such a class but it will be intermixed with activities, assignments outside of the classroom, group/team projects, audiovisual media, and opportunities for discussion of concepts. Perhaps most importantly, it is my firm belief that while you achieve a certain level of knowledge acquisition the most fundamental function of education is to learn how to think more critically and we will explore this in great detail during our time together.

#### **Office Hours**:

If you have questions or concerns about your assignments, readings, or grade in the class, please see me during office hours (as noted on this syllabus), or make an appointment with me so I can set specific time aside for you. If you need to chat about your presentation topic, please come and meet me in office.

## **Class Policies:**

Your contributions as a learner to this class are just as significant as mine so your attendance is critical. Do your work, read, and participate in class discussions. Seek out campus resources for additional help. Please act maturely and respectfully. You are expected to work hard and earn your grade.

## **Technology use:**

Class material, NOBA Sections (course text) and documents such as the syllabus, class slides, announcements, readings, assignments, and links to articles will be posted on the *Canvas* course website. You need to create a BC student network account (at <u>https://www.bellevuecollege.edu/netid/</u>) *MyBC* and access Canvas regularly. The student network account may be created any time after you receive your student identification number (SID) and personal identification number (PIN). For students enrolled in credit classes, the SID and PIN are issued after you apply for admissions. For students enrolled in classes through BC Continuing Education, the SID and PIN are established after you register for a class. ## **Course Purpose and Goals:**

The primary goal of the General Psychology course is to introduce you to the field of psychology, and the problems and issues that psychologists and cognitive neuroscientists study. Some psychologists are interested in how the brain influences behavior, while others study the observable aspects of behavior, how people learn, how children develop, abnormal behavior, and group/ social behavior. Psychology is a large field by any measure, and those trained in psychology teach, conduct research, deliver therapy, develop tests, consult in business and industry, and engage in many other activities. After participating, discussing, and completing this course, a successful student would show an understanding about the major themes, critical experiments, research findings, and who the leading scientists are in many of the major areas of psychology. Additionally, successful students would have an understanding of the important approaches used in the study of psychology, the major historical figures who have had a lasting impact on the field, statistical reasoning, vocabulary/jargon of the field, and what it means to study human beings, their cognitions, emotions, and behavior scientifically. These goals would be achieved best if you attend all the classes and participate actively in class discussions.

### **Required Textbook**:

Rather than a traditional text book, we will use a customized set of readings authored by leading scholars in the sub-disciplines of psychology and provided FREE of charge by the NOBA Project. **Study effectively** by self-testing. Each section of the text begins with few learning goals. Read the material, trying to understand the underlying ideas. A few minutes later, go back to the page and see if you meet the set goals.

This is a fast-paced class in which you will be given a good deal of autonomy. Consequently, you will need to be responsible for managing your time appropriately, and to contact the instructor in a <u>timely</u> manner if any circumstances arise that interfere with your ability to participate fully in class.

## **General Course Rules and Expectations:**

• <u>Attendance</u>: Attend all class meetings and <u>come to class ON TIME</u>. Your presence (physical as well as psychological) in the class contributes significantly toward your final grade in the course as I cover a lot of material in class that cannot be found in the readings. More than <u>three unexcused</u> absences or late attendances will lower your grade, and continue to do so as you miss more classes. To have an absence or tardy considered as "excused", you must discuss it with me PRIOR to the absence or tardy, unless it is an emergency. Excused absences include doctor's visits, family emergencies, and sometimes work-related issues. If you miss class, please a) inform me via Canvas inbox or BC email, and b) connect with your classmates before the next class to find out what you missed. I highly recommend that you get the names and contact information of <u>at</u> least one or two of your classmates so you can contact them for any assignments or notes you may have missed in your absence.

• <u>**Preparation**</u>: You should come to class having done all the assigned reading(s) and homework, and you should always bring the proper supplies with you daily including the reading, class slides, paper to take notes on, scantron, and pen(cil). Note that the <u>BC guideline for homework is two hours outside of class for each hour spent in class</u>.

• <u>Email communication</u>: Please type your course and section number (PSYC&100 A) in the subject line of any email you send to me. Questions appropriate for an email are those that can be answered with 1-2 sentence replies. Anything longer than this (e.g., an explanation of a concept) requires a face-to-face meeting. Please do not expect prompt replies to emails sent to me over the weekend or less than 24 hours before an exam.

• <u>Assignments</u>: All assignments are <u>due at the START of the class period</u>. Assignments, papers, or homework must be typed, printed out, stapled, and handed in at the beginning of class. Emailed assignments are NOT accepted. If you know you are going to be absent on the day an assignment is due, then turn it in early. All major due dates are indicated below in this syllabus as well as on the Canvas calendar.

• <u>Late Work</u>: I believe that one of the major lessons students take away from college is the importance of meeting deadlines. As a result, NO late work will be accepted unless you have had it approved by me BEFORE the due date. Late work will receive a **zero** grade.

• <u>Contribution</u>: Learning about each other's experiences and perspectives is an integral part of the learning process in this course. I believe that you will learn a lot about yourself and your fellow classmates. Therefore, you are expected to be an ACTIVE participant in our learning environment. An active participation can include contributing to discussions, but can also mean getting to class ON time, taking notes, listening to your peers, and coming to class prepared. You should do your best to contribute to class discussions and group activities. Please raise your hand whenever you'd like to contribute your opinion (unless told otherwise), and do not talk out of turn (no side conversations/ whispering to your neighbor or giving your unsolicited opinion without raised hand).

• <u>Classroom Etiquette</u>: All electronic devices are prohibited in the classroom at all times. This

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includes cell phones, blackberries, laptops, I-pods/mp3 players, etc. If you need a laptop to take notes, I will need prior verification. All texting devices must be in silent mode and placed in your bag for the duration of the class. Please note that texting, excessive talking, sleeping, or other disruptive behavior is not only disrespectful to me, it is also disrespectful to the classmates around you. Your participation grade will be affected and lowered by these types of behaviors.

• <u>**Respect</u>**: I expect that your behavior in the classroom be respectful. Learning about diverse experiences is central to this course, so it is of the utmost importance that you respect your classmates' experiences, differences, and opinions. In order for us to learn from each other, we have to allow each other to make mistakes and to offer unpopular positions for debate. This is a college classroom and as such, I expect students to behave as ADULTS. I do not tolerate excessive talking or whispering, consistent late arrivals, or early departures. Students who are disrespectful to their classmates or the instructor will be asked to leave class and will be marked absent until arrangements are made with the instructor to return to class and will result in your participation credit lowering.</u>

• <u>Plagiarism</u>: Cheating, stealing, and plagiarizing (using the ideas or words of another person as one's own without crediting the source) are violations of the Student Code of Conduct at Bellevue College. This is a <u>serious offense</u>, which can result in possible probation or suspension from Bellevue College and go on your permanent academic record. DO NOT DO IT! If you cheat/ plagiarize, you FAIL. No excuses will be taken into account. Your work must be your own, except when you are asked to work with other students. Furthermore, you are required to acknowledge in your papers if you have borrowed any ideas, terms or phrases. Do not copy and paste material from Wikipedia or any other website into your assignments, as with is a severe form of cheating (that is very easy to catch, by the way). In this class your assignments should be grounded in the textbook rather than web resources, which are often wrong. If you have any hesitation or if you are in doubt about one of these issues, feel free to ask me.

• <u>Academics not Therapy:</u> The course involves the academic exchange of general ideas, theories, and research data related to the topic of Psychology. Thus, it may touch on topics that are personally relevant to some individuals. I am happy to aid you as a resource and help you find necessary resources. However, this course is not a therapy setting and it does not provide the typical safeguards of privacy found in a therapy setting. Consequently, it is important to learn to distinguish "who, when, and where to share private information". If a student has a personal experience that may add to the class discussion, please do not identify the name or identity (sister, ex-husband...) of the people involved. It is acceptable, preferred, and encouraged that you utilize a 'general reference' such as: "There is a person that...; I know someone that..." As has occurred in the past, if a student discusses personal information that I consider to not be appropriate for class, I will re-direct the conversation and speak with the person about resources outside of the classroom that may be helpful. One of the most important ethical considerations that you will learn about if you continue in this field is that of confidentiality and appropriate boundaries.

• <u>Use of Technology in Class</u>: Last, there is no use of technology in the classroom for note taking, do not use a cell phone or any device to take a picture of the screen, obtain permission from me prior to recording in any fashion, and do not use laptops or tablets to type notes. Classroom notes must be handwritten

• <u>Wireless Devices & Personal Computers:</u> All wireless devices are to be turned OFF and out of sight while in this classroom. Students whose cell phones ring, who engage in sending or receiving text messages, check emails, are seen wearing ear-buds, or are using electronic devices for any purpose will be asked to remove themselves from the classroom for the remainder of the class period. I also reserve the right to answer any student's phone that rings during class. If the problem persists, the student(s) will be referred to the Dean of Student Success for appropriate disciplinary actions.

**TAKE CARE OF YOURSELF!** Stay hydrated, eat protein bars, seek counseling and advising for additional help, take deep breaths, do things to ensure your well-being. This is 5 days, 50 min class, and so schedule accordingly.

## Format of course and course requirements:

The course will follow a variety of formats including traditional lecture, group discussions, in-class activities, and with questions both expected and encouraged. Textbook matter will be supplemented with other materials such as empirical journal articles (pay attention to the announcements section in Canvas), Ted Talks/ videos, media reports, as well as the student support resources website. In a course of this size, it is important to exercise some judgment to ensure that questions are of general interest and are asked as clearly and audibly as possible. It is also helpful if you complete each week's reading assignment before the class meeting.

Learners will be evaluated in the following SIX ways:

- 1. <u>Attendance and Course Participation</u> (200 points out of 1000; 20%) Attendance is always expected. Participation is essential to the format of this class and will therefore contribute significantly toward your grade. In short, your success in this course depends on your active participation in class as well as completion of homework. Participation includes daily attendance, getting to class ON time, actively contributing in class discussions, engaging in group work, and coming prepared to class by doing the readings, watching the videos on Canvas. Quality of participation will be rewarded over quantity, including demonstrated attentive listening. Disruptive behavior, excessive talking, texting while in class, or other interruptions will lower this portion of your grade. Please do not take this portion of your grade lightly!
- 2. Weekly Quizzes (140 points out of 1000; 20 points each; 14%) Seven in-class quizzes will be given throughout the quarter on the reading materials and will be worth 20 points each. Quizzes will be held at the beginning of class, so if you come in late, you will miss the quiz and receive a zero grade. There will be NO make-up for a missed quiz. All quizzes and exams require a scantron and #2 pencil. These materials can be purchased in the bookstore and you are responsible for providing them. The purpose of these quizzes is to ensure that you have done the readings and understand them on a basic level. These quizzes will also help you in learning material for your exams.
- 3. <u>Psychology Poster Board Project (100 points out of 1000; 10%)</u> This is a <u>team</u> assignment. Students will collaboratively work in teams during the quarter on one of the chosen topics that demonstrates how psychological theory, application of psychological principals, or career paths in psychology. Teams will choose from one of the following topics: *Social Psychology, Careers in Psychology, Developmental Psychology, Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity, Applied Psychology: Road Rage, Psychological Disorders, Addiction, Schools of Thought in Psychology, Applied Psychology: Bullying, Applied Psychology: Pornography, Applied Psychology: Suicide, or Applied Psychology: Sexual Motivation and Behaviors. Students will be divided into teams by random*

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assignment. Each team will provide the following information by the end of the quarter and present a 10 minute poster session on finals day.

- a. Definition of the topic, a breakdown into subtopics, and three references with citations in APA style of articles from this field of psychology.
- b. Teams with general topics can choose any subtopics within their topic to speak about, for instance under lifespan a team could present psychosocial stages of development across the lifespan and cognitive developmental theories or they could take an approach in presenting the stages of the life and major developmental themes. Those that are assigned an Applied Psychology Topic are required to present at least three different theories that explain the behavior(s) involved; for instance, road rage might seek to explain the behavior from behavioral, psychoanalytic, and social learning theory viewpoints.

Each group will be responsible to submit two final written products that include a 36 x 48 inch <u>tri-fold (50</u> points) to be presented during a finals session and a <u>two-page handout (50</u> points) of the poster to be duplicated and shared with all classmates as an informative summary.

- 4. Online Discussion Questions in Canvas (60 points out of 1000; 6%) During weeks four and eight there will be online discussion questions that will be based upon the material covered in those weeks. The expectation is that learners will write a minimum 500 word response in which they address the question by using examples, definitions, etc. as appropriate to answer the question given. It is also expected that learners will properly cite and reference any material used to answer these questions.
- 5. <u>Film Reviews (150 points out of 1000; 15%)</u> In weeks six and nine a two page paper, no abstract, with references and citations on the third page, will be written on specific psychological concepts and topics. Each one is worth 75 points towards your final grade.
- 6. <u>Written APA Assignment (50 points; 5%)</u> In week three learners will complete an APA writing assignment that addresses the language of writing per the American Psychological Association by reviewing a sample paper and summarizing a scholarly article posted in Canvas.
- 7. Exams (300 points out of 1000; 30%) There will be three exams worth 100 points each that will count towards your final grade in class. Over the course of the quarter, you will take three exams that integrate the course's in-class activities (lectures, video clips etc.) and textbook readings. Exams are designed to make sure you understand important course concepts and themes. Each exam will consist of multiple-choice questions, true/ false statements, and/or a few short answer questions. Please note that I DO NOT give make-up exams, OR allow students taking exams early or late.

#### If for some reason my grading is not clear, you have further questions about how I graded an assignment, or any other concern please come speak with me. Again, education is more than just knowledge acquisition so I encourage you to communicate with me whenever there are questions.

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete ("I"). It is the student's responsibility for maintaining contact and adhering to the agreed-upon actions. Canvas class sites, and material, may not be directly accessible after the end of the quarter so it is important to make arrangements before the quarter ends. The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade (usually an "F"). There is a standard form that instructors have access to in their instructor's grade briefcase.

#### F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

#### **Final Examination Schedule**

Final examinations may involve proctored on-campus arranged exams or may be administrated completely online at the discretion of the instructor and in keeping with the stated policies provided in the course syllabus. Please refer to the syllabus at the start of the quarter for additional details and contact the instructor directly for any clarifications. A student who is not in compliance with the scheduled format may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be in compliance with any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

#### Withdrawal from Class

Academic Year: College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.

Summer Quarter: College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the fifth week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). After the sixth day and through the end of the fifth week of the quarter, the "Th" grade will become part of the student's transcript record. As with most enrollment deadlines, it is the student's responsibility t be aware of these dates and act accordingly. Here are some important deadlines: *Last day to withdraw with a 100% refund* – April 7, 2017 *Last day to withdraw from a course without a "W" posted on your transcript* – April 14, 2017 *Last day to withdraw from a class* ("W" will be posted on your transcript) – May 19 (in person) and May 21, 2017 (online)

#### Hardship Withdrawal (HW)

Hardship Withdrawal indicates a withdrawal request made because of extenuating circumstances after the official withdrawal period is over. The student must contact the instructor to request this withdrawal option, or the faculty member may initiate the contact. No points are calculated into the grade-point average. Students may also contact the enrollment Services Office BEFORE grades are assigned in cases of hardship.

#### Students Who Require Disability Accommodations
