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Course Description

What is the Black Experience in America? This will be the question that sets the context for this class. We will challenge ourselves to critically engage with the African American Experience through a careful examination of five dominant themes: History, Social Movements, Literature, Media Imaging and Contemporary Issues. Through this examination, a greater picture will emerge in regards to the Black experience in America. This class will offer a critique and challenge to the idea that the Black Experience is monolithic. The diversity of the Black experience will be explored and investigated in an academic setting. This class will be a democratic experiment and everyone's voice is imperative in this sociological exploration.

Assignment

Salvation Essay/ 30 points: There will be an essay assigned where you will be writing on themes and ideas from the book Salvation. There will be more details on this essay throughout the quarter.

Movie Reviews/ 60 points: We will be watching three films that deal with the Black experience. After the completion of the film, you will be answering a sociological question that allows for you to examine the sociological realities of blackness through film.

Between the World and Me Essay/ Presentation: The final assignment will be either an essay dealing with the book or a presentation that deals with and examines the ideological underpinnings of the book. This assignment will be discussed in further detail throughout the quarter.

Participation

It is imperative that you recognize that you are required to do more than attend. I expect students to engage and be active in the creation of a strong intellectual community. Being a passive participant will not be tolerated.

Plagiarism
