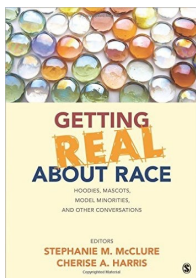

- Note any new due dates or due date changes
- Check "Questions for Prof E" Discussion Board; post question(s) as needed.
- Calendar any assignments coming due by the end of the upcoming weekend
- Upload assignments as needed
