Course Information

The course analyzes constitutional government in America in terms of the theory and practices of democracy. Students investigate issues of individual rights, popular representation, and responsible leadership.

Course Outcomes

- Evaluate the basic nature of Constitutional government in America.
- Understand concepts such as separation of power and checks and balances as outlined in the constitution.
- Recall and define problems of individual rights, popular representation and responsible leadership.
- Identify roles of the Executive department, the Congress, and the Judicial branch.
- Have an understanding of the public policy making process in the U.S.
- Have the skills and knowledge necessary for analyzing American politics according to the ideals of American democracy.

Exams are non-cumulative and will consist of multiple choice, short answer, and short essay questions.

A number of unannounced quizzes will be given over the course of the semester. Quizzes will pertain to material covered in lecture and in the textbook. Students should **read each chapter prior to the class in which it will be discussed** and be prepared to participate in discussion and ask questions in order to do well on these quizzes. Your 2 lowest quiz grades will be dropped. As such, there will be **no makeup quizzes**.

Attendance policy: Attendance for this course is mandatory and will be taken during each class session. Students are **allowed four (4) absences** over the course of the semester without any loss of attendance points. **Beginning with the fifth (5th) absence**, however, points will be deducted from your attendance grade. **Fifteen (15) points** will be deducted from your attendance grade for every absence over your four allowed absences. Example: 5 absences will yield a score of 85 out of 100 for attendance/participation.
