Class Format

This is an online course that does not require us to meet face to face on campus. You are expected to attend the online classroom for AT LEAST one hour, four times per week. To be successful in this class, you will need to be reading the textbook, viewing the materials, videos and any power points, and reviewing guidelines and grading rubrics posted within the weekly Modules and Files Section on the Canvas classroom page. The requirements, expectations, grading rubrics and other important information will be listed below. PLEASE READ SYLLABUS THOROUGHLY.

Course Overview

This course will familiarize you with the criminal justice system as well as its purpose and goals; the components it takes to function cohesively; the stakeholders who play a role; and finally, future implications for the system.

Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Use a working vocabulary based on the terminology used in the three components of the Criminal Justice System.
- Differentiate between the workings and responsibilities of the three major components of the American Criminal Justice System: the police, the courts and corrections.
- Describe the theories, models and concepts within the Criminal Justice System and determine their strengths and weaknesses.
- Explain how laws are made, categorized and enforced and the process of deciding how these laws are applied to case based situations.
- Identify the reasons why experts in the field think the term Criminal Justice System is a myth and a true system is non-existent.
- Examine the current major issues within the Criminal Justice System and be able to explain those issues giving case based examples of what they are.

Course Materials

Required Text: *Introduction to Criminal Justice* (9th Edition); Authors: Bohm and Haley (2018); ISBN: 9780077860509. **NOTE:** You are required to have this text (in your format preference). Older versions of this text are not to be used.

Software: Microsoft Word is the only word processor supported at BC. You must submit assignments/papers in Microsoft Word or PDF format. Documents in any other format will not be accepted. **NOTE:** Documents submitted via email will not be accepted unless explicitly stated within the instructions.

Course Requirements:

- <u>Reading:</u> It is imperative that you read the required text as it is assigned, if you do not utilize the textbook it will be difficult to get through this course. Make sure you are prepared with the textbook and are keeping up to date with where we are at in the book throughout the quarter.
- <u>Power Points:</u> Similar to the reading, power points will be important to review every week, quizzes and exams will be based on the reading and power points.
- <u>Discussion Boards & Responses:</u> There will be eight (8) discussion board posts (worth 20 points each), not including your Introduction post (worth 10 points) in the 'Getting Started' module. Discussions board posts need to be thorough and thoughtful, utilizing the materials that were assigned in that week's module. You will need to respond to the discussion board prompt for each week AND respond to two (2) classmates by **Sunday at 11:59pm PST** every week. If you engage in a conversation or debate with classmates on a thread as a result of your response that only counts as one (1) response.
 - NOTE: late discussion board posts AND/OR replies will not be accepted.
- <u>Assignment(s):</u>
 - Reviews: For this assignment, you will need to analyze the outside source(s) provided within the assignment. Formats will differ for this assignment, materials could include articles, documentaries, podcasts, etc. You will need to give a summary of the material(s), explain how it is relevant to the area of the system you are addressing and then explain if you think the findings/conclusions of the material(s) are useful (if applicable). Each assignment/review is worth 45 points.
 - You will need to complete one (1) assignment/review for each area of the system the third assignment will not be mandatory but an opportunity for extra credit:
 - Assignment #1 Police (**Due 04/30/18**)
 - Assignment #2 Courts (**Due 05/28/18**)
 - EXTRA CREDIT: Assignment #3 Corrections (Due 06/12/18)
- <u>Quizzes:</u> There will be four (4) quizzes throughout the quarter. They will be based on the textbook, power points, and other assigned materials and will consist of multiple choice, true/false, and short answer questions. Quizzes will open on **Friday at 5:00pm PST** and will be due by **Sunday at 11:59pm PST**.
 - NOTE: The quizzes cannot be unlocked early. In addition, if your quiz is not completed by 11:59pm it will be locked out and you will not have a chance to submit or complete partial quizzes.
- <u>Final Comprehensive Exam</u>: The final exam will be comprehensive and cover all material covered throughout the quarter. This will be a timed test with multiple choice, true/false, and short answer questions. It will open on **Monday**, **06/11/2018 at 12:00am PST** and be due by **Tuesday**, **06/12/2018 at 11:59pm PST**. Further information will be posted about the final exam in May. The final exam is worth 100 points.
 - NOTE: If your final is not submitted by 11:59pm on 06/12/2018 it will be locked out and you will not have a chance to submit or complete the final.
