Course Description


This course investigates the psychological study of people from different cultures – both subcultures within the US and peoples from around the world. It also addresses the question of universality of psychological phenomenon.

The concepts that we will cover include but are not limited to: (1) an overview of research methods in studying culture, (2) understanding common psychological and behavioral concepts (e.g., motivation, personality, emotions, self-concept, cognition and perception) presented through the lens of cultural psychology; and (3) becoming more culturally competent in the multicultural world in which we live. Although our main resource will be the cultural psychology text (referenced above), we will augment various topics using additional readings.

Student Learning Objectives

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Describe the ways in which culture, beliefs, values, and behavior interact.
- Identify ethnocentrism in psychological thought, theory, and research methods, and suggest means for reducing bias in the study of human behavior.
- Demonstrate respect for the wide diversity of human behavior as well as knowledge of the common threads and values.
- Explain the relevance of psychology and other disciplines in understanding human behavior from a global perspective.
- Describe how culture and the environment might be important variables in situations one expects to encounter.
- Demonstrate competencies in functioning in a diverse society, thus making crosscultural interactions more productive and enjoyable.
- Apply concepts from the course to events and everyday behavior of people from other cultures.



Course Requirements

Tests:

There will be five on-line unit tests covering material from the reading, power point lecture notes, and discussions. Tests will be given on-line as scheduled on the calendar every two weeks and will be open Friday-Sunday, except the last exam which will be given the last few days of the quarter. Tests will include a combination of multiple choice, true false, and matching questions, and study guides will be provided. There will be no comprehensive final exam; the last unit test will include some reflection on learning from the whole quarter. Exams will be worth 70 points each or 50% of the final grade.

Assignments:

There will be 5 short assignments, due every other week, and a research paper due at the end of the guarter.

These assignments will ask you to apply the ideas of the course, and will be due online as noted on the calendar. Each assignment will be described fully in the appropriate module. (20 points each; 100 points total)

Research Paper

The Research Paper Assignment asks you to research information about a cultural practice in a particular culture using library resources. You will be able to choose the specific practice from a provided list as well as the culture to be investigated. You will need to post a proposal for your topic and culture (10 points). Once your research is completed, you will write a research paper using APA formatting. Details about the assignment and specific requirements will be available mid-quarter (80 points).

Discussions:

There will be one online discussion a week related to the text material. You will be able to choose a question from a list of questions, write a response to that question, and respond to a student who answers a different question. There will also be a closing discussion the last week. Some of the questions will ask you to provide an example illustrating a concept, some will ask you to do an activity and report on the results, and some will ask you to respond to one of the questions at the back of the relevant chapter.

The discussion sessions will run from Monday to Saturday every week. Questions will be posted on Monday mornings. You will need to respond to one of the questions by

Friday night, and to post a response to a student who answered a different question by Saturday night. You are also expected to cite the text in at least one post and to read students' posts in each discussion. More specific instructions are available in the "Course Structure and Expectations" in the Getting Started Module. Discussions are worth 15 points each or 150 points total, plus 10 points for the Closing Discussion (160 points).

Extra Credit:

There will be some opportunities over the course of the quarter to earn up to 5 extra credit points. These will be posted in some of the modules.
