The Violent Face of Nature (5 credits Natural Science) GEOG108

Welcome to Geography 108. This is a five-credit, natural science course that fulfills a Science distribution requirement for the Associate in Arts and Sciences **(AAS)** Degree at Bellevue College. There are no prerequisites for this class.

The course transfers as natural science credit.

Course Description/Objectives:

This is a survey course designed to introduce students to earth and atmospheric potential hazards as reflected or evidenced by actual catastrophes or disasters. The course will strive to elevate student awareness regarding dangerous interactions between earth processes and the human landscape, as well as the interrelationships between potential disasters. Throughout the course case studies are used to aid in understanding the complexities of environmental processes and policies, societal behaviors, and governmental responsibilities. In addition to the textbook, a variety of images and videos will be used in class to enhance the delivery of course information.

Format.

The class is sequenced in the following order.

The two exams will contain a series of multiple choice questions. Some of these questions you will have already answered from the 'Homework Questions' (see Modules page) that are answered directly from the textbook. The remainder of the questions are from the class work - which is mostly composed of a series of PowerPoints and videos - and will be posted on this site (see the Files link on the left hand menu bar to go to this classwork). There will also be a series of images to answer on these exams. You will be given the list of 'possible images' from which this group will be chosen. You may bring into the exams personal hand written notes on 4 sides of A4 note paper to assist you in answering these exams. Please note that these personal study notes must be in your own handwriting and not typed and/or photocopied.

Discussion Topics: In addition to the Mid-Term and Final Exams you are asked to submit a series of **5 Discussion Topics by using this Canvas system.** You can see these listed on the Modules page - with the instructions for each and the deadline dates. Please note that there are no make-ups and the deadline dates are set. You will make a series of posts with your opening post worth a maximum of 15 points and the first response post to one of your classmates worth 3 points and the second response post worth 2 points - for a possible total of 20 points. **Total possible points 100.**

Attendance: attendance is a required part of the course and you will secure 5 points for complete attendance at every class. There are 18 regular classes (the class time used for the Mid-Term and Final are not counted) and you can secure 90 points if you attend every class. If you miss one class due to ill health please let me know and you will not miss these points on one occasion during the quarter.

Course Grading: Total possible points is 390 plus extra credit.

Extra Credit points: a total of up to 30 points -

10 points will be added to your total accumulated points if you complete the **class evaluation. There are also 4 'pop quizzes'** during the quarter and they can secure you a **maximum of 20 points of extra credit.** I will not be giving out the specific dates for these extra credit quizzes, but will give you some notification in class when we anticipate taking these quizzes. They will be based on work covered and you will be divided into small teams - the first placed team will secure 5 points of credit, the second team 4 points and the third placed team 3 points with everyone else in attendance securing 2 points.

Incomplete

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

The Social Science Division will adhere to the final examination schedule as stated in the BC Schedule. Final examinations will be held at the end of each quarter at fixed times. Instructors will not give examinations in advance of the regular schedule. A student who is absent from any examination held at any time during the quarter may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be present at any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

Hardship Withdrawal
