### PSYC 209 Fundamentals of Psychological Research • 5 CR

• Course Outcomes • Explain the scientific process and the research methods psychologists and behavioral scientists use in the study of human behavior. • Apply relevant research and statistical terms, concepts, and principles used in the study of human behavior. • Evaluate and compare various research methods and designs used to guide and develop research investigations. • Prioritize and apply ethical principles in the conduct of research.

• How Outcomes Will be Met

Covers theories, techniques, and applications of psychological research methodology. Students explore a variety of approaches, ranging from uncontrolled field observation to laboratory experiments. Topics include data analysis, report writing, and factors affecting research results. Prerequisite: PSYC& 100

#### **Assessment and Grading**

In my grading philosophy, I encourage students to take responsibility for their own learning and to learn how to do thoughtful and realistic self-assessment. In my feedback, I will provide a percentage score as well as written feedback in which I will focus on the strengths and weaknesses of your work and help you in setting improvement goals for yourself. I would also like <u>you</u> to reflect on your own work and hold yourself accountable for meeting a standard of excellence. I always think of written work as "works in progress" and you are always encouraged to redo a piece of work if you would like to improve your grade. (I must receive your redo within one week of handing back the assignment.) Your final grade in Psychology 100 will be computed by dividing the points you have earned divided by the total points possible in the class. Your grade is thus based on the following:

- Class participation & class assignments (20% of final grade). Attendance and participation is required in this class. I will collect your in-class work <u>every week</u> to assess participation, as well as doing spot checks during class as you work in groups. In addition, I will distribute a self-evaluation form for you to use to evaluate your own participation at the end of the quarter.
- 2. In-Class quizzes and Video reflections (20 % of final grade) We will have quizzes for each chapter on terms and concepts from the reading. Chapter 1 is a freebie then 2-on counts towards your 20%... Due dates are on the chapter schedule!! And are always first thing on Monday class meeting!!
- Phase 1 (15% of final grade) Forming a scientific inquiry.
  Find an area of inquiry. Develop a perfectly articulated hypothesis statement. Complete IRB application.
- Phase 2 (15% of final grade) Developing a specific research methodology and executing the design. This section is primarily about creating your specific design and preparing to execute that design.
- 5. Phase 3 (15% of final grade) Collecting Data and crunching numbers. Either collecting original data or finding original data from another source. Determining statistical significance and understanding some of the basic statistical methodologies. Conducting statistical/mathematical calculations on your data set.
- 6. Phase 4 (15% of final grade) Sharing with the public(this class). Preparing an APA paper and presenting you findings.

#### **Expectations, Agreements, and Information**

If you miss a due date for an assignment, a doctor's written excuse is required, or your grade will be severely penalized for **late work** (10% per calendar day).
