COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course surveys the concepts and methods of geography by examining humankind's influence on the environment and the environment's impact on humankind. Topics include patterns and processes of world climates, culture, population, urbanization, economic activities, and resources.

- Explain in short in-class tests and through the interpretation of weather maps the dynamic nature of the atmosphere.
- Recognize through written work and map study the spatial distribution of humankind.
- Accurately and informatively explain in written essays the dynamics of urban environments.
- Explain in written form a critical appreciation of the importance of the economic component within regions and its role in determining potential values, perceptions and decision-making processes in a society.

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

Course Chapters and Chapter Quizzes: Each of the chapters in the class covers one key theme of geographic inquiry. The 'Introduction to Geography' ebook contains the 10 chapters that we will read and the ebook assessment system will be used to take these weekly chapter quizzes. At the end of each chapter you will find 15 review questions. Although you do not turn these in, some of these questions will show up on the chapter quiz. You should create a study guide that highlights key points and material from the chapter.

Each chapter quiz has an open book/open note format with multiple-choice questions and is taken online using the ebook assessment system. There will be 10 questions in each chapter quiz. 5 will be selected from the 15 review questions and there will be an additional 5 questions selected from material in the relevant chapter. The chapter quizzes are due on Mondays at 11:59PM and they cover the chapter from the previous week.

Map Exercises: There are 5 map exercises to take and each one is worth 20 points. The map exercises are timed quizzes on Canvas (not the ebook assessment page), and are all due by the end of the quarter. The details on how to prepare for these map exercises are found when you go to the Home Page on the Canvas site, under "Map Exercises". You will need access to an atlas. Many of you will be tempted to use maps from Google or elsewhere online. I would highly recommend attaining an actual atlas as it will be easier to locate world regions and specific areas compared to relying on Google. You should be able to find an atlas at the library or for a reasonable price on amazon.com or ebay.com.

Discussion Topics: The discussion topics are opportunities to discuss important concepts and topics using the analytical tools from the course material. There will be 5 discussion topics throughout the quarter for a total of 100 points. Some discussions will be submitted using the Discussion Tool on the class Canvas website. Some discussions will take place during class.

Midterm and Final Exam: The midterm and final will each be worth 100 points. The midterm includes multiple choice questions from topics covered in chapters 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. In addition, there will be a selection of 6 images and each will require a written response from you. Each image will require you to identify it and to write about the image with as much information as you can. The final exam will be the same format as the midterm and cover chapters 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10. Both the mid-term and final exams will contain questions from the chapter review questions.

LATE WORK AND CLASSROOM POLICIES

*These policies may apply differently to students with DRC accommodations. I will be working with all students individually to meet their accommodations.

• **Canvas:** Students are required to use Canvas during this class. We will be using it in very specific ways. Important documents such as the syllabus and map exercises will be posted on Canvas. Additionally, I will communicate to the class using Canvas's "Announcements" function. It is imperative that students edit Canvas notifications to ensure that my announcements in Canvas end up in their preferred location (email or text). I will use Canvas announcements for unexpected issues such as being out sick or school closures.

- Attendance: I will be taking attendance in this class, but students are not graded on attendance or participation. It is important that students attend class everyday and arrive on time.
- Late work: The chapter quizzes and discussion topics can be turned it by the end of the quarter for 75% of the grade. The midterm and final exam must be taken on the day(s) given, unless there is a documented emergency.

If you are falling behind due to emergency/unforeseen circumstances, you can work with me to create an individualized plan.

- If English is not your first language: Please check in with me about the quizzes and exams to discuss how I can best support you.
- Electronic devices: I prohibit the use of laptops in the classroom during lectures and most activities. During certain group activities associated with the watchdog report, I will make an announcement that students can bring/use their laptops. I also do not allow students to record audio or video during the class. I do not consent to being recorded in any way during class, office hours or appointments. We will occasionally use smart phones for in-class polling apps such as Kahoot!. Otherwise, I require that cell phones be put away.
- **Plagiarism/Cheating:** Plagiarism and cheating are serious offenses that violate BC's student code of conduct. Students who violate the school's policies are required to meet with me for a one-on-one meeting. I will report violations to BC's CARE Team. Please be in touch with me if you are unsure of what constitutes this type of violation.
- Appointments, Email and Canvas Inbox: The best way to communicate with me is in-person during office hours and in appointments. I will also allot some class time for individual questions. Students can also contact me through my BC phone, my BC email, or the Canvas mail function (inbox). I may check these at odd hours, such as at night or over the weekend. But I will not reply outside of regular business hours. On my end I will be answering your messages swiftly during business hours. However, if I do not answer your inquiry in about a day, you should feel comfortable to follow up. Don't be shy if I haven't followed up. It is likely due to other tasks taking priority.

Please use Outlook to schedule appointments with me. This is a simple technique that will eliminate back and forth emails. I have created a tutorial video on the Canvas homepage to show you how to do this.
