Course Format

This is a hybrid course that meets on campus on Tuesday and Thursday. You are expected to attend the class meetings as scheduled and directed in the syllabus below and engage online (CANVAS) as directed (hybrid course). To be successful in this class you will need to be attending class and engaging within class discussions; reading the textbook, reviewing materials provided, videos and any power points, and reviewing guidelines and grading rubrics posted within the weekly Modules and Files Section on the Canvas classroom page. Course Overview

Surveys theories and concepts of law pertaining to the criminal justice system. Topics include the Revised Code of Washington and specific state and federal constitutional amendments.

Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Use the basic vocabulary of law (e.g., culpability, mens rea, probable cause, rule of law, etc.)
- Distinguish between "Common Law", the "Model Code", and the "Revised Code of Washington."
- Paraphrase the categories and sources of criminal and civil law.
- Accurately and informatively explain and give examples of the conceptual and statutory differences between "civil" and "criminal" law.
- Illustrate why general knowledge of "criminal" and "civil" law is important in the daily lives of all citizens.
- Identify, explain and discuss in writings and discussions the theory behind the development of "criminal" and "civil" laws.
- Classify the key elements to specific criminal statutes in the Revised Code of Washington.
- Identify, explain and discuss the major purposes of criminal law.

Course Requirements

Reading: It is imperative that you read the required text as it is assigned, if you do not utilize the textbook it will be difficult to get through this course. Make sure you are prepared with the textbook and are keeping up to date with where we are at in the book throughout the quarter.

<u>Participation</u>: Participation within classroom discussion is necessary to earn full participation points for the quarter – worth 100 points of overall grade for course. There are 20 class meetings for the quarter and students will earn 5 points for each day in attendance, engaged in discussion, and participating.

<u>Discussion Boards & Responses:</u> There will be five (5) discussion board posts (worth 20 points each). Discussions board posts need to be thorough and thoughtful, utilizing the materials that were assigned in that week's module. You will need to respond to the discussion board prompt for each week AND respond to two (2) classmates by **Sunday at 11:59pm PST** on the weeks that discussion board posts are due. If you engage in a conversation or debate with classmates on a thread as a result of your response that only counts as one (1) response.

Assignment(s):

- Each assignment/review is worth 30 points, 1-2 pages in length approx., will vary depending on assigned task.

Final Exam: The final exam will be comprehensive and cover all material covered throughout the quarter – it will be worth 100 points of your overall grade. This will be a timed exam and you will be required to complete the exam on Canvas sometime between Monday, 12/2/19 at 9am and Tuesday, 12/3/19 at 11:59pm.
