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Course Description

Welcome to Lifespan Psychology 200! The purpose of the course is to introduce you to the major concepts, theories and research findings in lifespan development. We'll discuss the roles of heredity and environment in shaping development as well as cross-cultural influences in development. We'll cover prenatal development, and various biological, cognitive, emotional, and social aspects of development during infancy, childhood, adolescence, and early, middle, and late adulthood. **Please read this entire syllabus as it contains a lot of important information regarding the class!** If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me as soon as possible.

ALL THE INSTRUCTION IN THIS CLASS OCCURS ONLINE, INCLUDING THE EXAMS. THERE ARE NO SCHEDULED MEETINGS ON CAMPUS.

Course Material:

You are required to purchase access to the digital product REVEL for:

Human Development: A cultural approach by Jeffrey Arnett, 2nd Edition, Pearson

The REVEL website is an interactive experience that helps you engage with the complex, detailed material we cover in this class. It contains the eBook and interactive quizzes that you are required to take. While access to Revel is required, the printed version of this text is optional.

There are two ways to purchase Revel access.

Choose the option that works best for you:

Option #1: Purchase a Revel access code from the campus bookstore (about \$92).

Option #2: Online Instant Access: You can purchase Revel access online. You will see this as an option after clicking on the course invite link listed below (about \$80).

When you buy an access code, you get access to the e-book at the same time, included in the access code price. When you register (via the bookstore access code or online instant access), you also have the option of adding the printed loose-leaf version of the book for \$19.95 extra. It will be

shipped to you with no shipping cost. You could also find the book on Amazon or other outside websites. Even if you purchase the printed book, I recommend that you at least look at the eBook too, because it includes interactive features besides the assigned quizzes that might help you in learning the material (videos, short quizzes in between chapter sections, definitions, notes, interactive note taking functions, flash cards).

Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Identify and explain the issues involved in the scientific study of human development across the lifespan, from conception through death, through the interaction of biological, psychological, and social aspects of human development across the lifespan.
- Distinguish between the contributions of influential theorists in developmental psychology, such as Piaget, Ainsworth, Kohlberg, Bronfenbrenner, Vygotsky, Arnett, and Erikson.
- Relate course materials to a personal perspective on human developmental experiences, as well as learn how to test theories using qualitative and quantitative research methods.
- Identify and critically reflect on the variability and diversity of developmental pathways, and their own embeddedness in social, cultural, and political contexts.
- Apply knowledge of cross-cultural research to developmental differences across the life span.

IMPORTANT: We use Canvas in this course. I will be posting class materials and documents on the Canvas site. You can access Canvas on the Bellevue College website.

Student Exams & Activities (600 points total)

- 1) **REVEL guizzes (180 points):** The Revel website has two different kinds of guizzes: short module guizzes at the end of each text module (section), and a longer chapter guiz at the end of each chapter. We will complete 13 Revel chapters, but 12 are required for full 180 points. For full points, you need to complete both the module guizzes and the chapter guiz. Any points collected above 180 count as extra credit. Alternatively, you can miss one chapter with no loss of points. No late Revel guizzes are accepted for any reason. For each chapter, you get 5 points for completing all of the module quizzes for any score and 10 points for a passed chapter quiz towards your grade in the class (I will enter these points in Canvas for your convenience, so that you can track your grade during the quarter). This means that you can get a total of 15 points per chapter towards your grade (12 chapters x 15 points = 180 points). The Revel chapter due date is Sunday at 11:59 pm. Most weeks one or two chapters are due (see the course schedule for specifics). The guizzes consist of multiplechoice questions, and if you give an incorrect answer, the quiz notifies you of this and provides additional information. You need to take each module guiz at the end of each book section/module (short "module quizzes", typically about 5 questions). Each module quiz question is worth 3 points initially, and you have two attempts such that if you answer wrong, you lose 1 point. For completing ALL of these short module guizzes, you get 5 points towards your class grade for a chapter regardless of what your score is for each quiz. To get the 5 points, you need to complete EVERY MODULE QUIZ in the chapter. For the longer chapter quiz at the end of each chapter, your score matters. You have two tries for each question in the chapter guizzes. Each guestion is initially worth 5 points, but if you give an incorrect answer, you lose 2 points. If you give 2 incorrect answers for a question, you get 0 points for that particular question: for each question, you can get either 5 points (first answer is correct), 3 points (second answer is correct) or 0 points. You pass the chapter guiz only if you get at least 80% in the guiz: You get 10 points towards your class grade for a chapter guiz you pass with a score of at least 80% (the actual points vary because the number of questions varies in the chapter quizzes). If you get less than 80% for a chapter quiz, you will not receive any points towards your final grade for that chapter quiz. Each Revel eBook chapter also has interactive charts, videos, note-taking functions and other resources. Using these additional resources is optional. The guizzes for all the assigned chapters are available until the deadline for each quiz, so you can start taking them anytime. You can take breaks during the quiz, go back to them, and the quizzes are NOT TIMED, but once you submit each question (by clicking SUBMIT), you can't undo that action. Take the chapter guiz which counts towards your grade only when you have studied the chapter. NO LATE QUIZZES ARE ALLOWED FOR ANY REASON. You have a lot of time to take the guizzes, and you should not leave them for the last minute. TO RECAP: to get the full points for a chapter, you must take ALL the module guizzes but your score does not matter (you get 5 points towards your class grade), and the chapter quiz with a score of at least 80% (you get 10 points towards your class grade).
- 2) Exams (160 points): There will be 4 exams that are taken online in Canvas, and each exam is worth 40 points. The exams are not cumulative: each exam covers the chapters assigned for one module. Once you start the exam, you must finish it, and you have 90 minutes to complete the exam. Each exam has 4 essay questions and an extra credit question. No late exams are allowed without documentation such as a doctor's note, a death certificate or another applicable document. A student who has a legitimate medical situation or other

emergency needs to communicate with me promptly and contact me as early as possible BEFORE the exam due date (if this is not possible, the reason for the late communication must be documented; e.g. hospitalization with a severe illness).

- 3) Lifespan Psychology in a creative work (50 points): Pick a creative work in which you can clearly identify at least one character who is in a developmental stage discussed in this class (infancy, toddlerhood, early or middle childhood, adolescence, emerging adulthood, early, middle or late adulthood). Analyze this creative work based on the character's developmental stage(s) according to the instructions provided in Canvas. In your assignment, you need to use developmental concepts/terminology we have learned in this class. Your assignment needs to be at least 3 pages (double spaced). When you refer to academic sources, you need to use APA format in-text citations and an APA format reference list. You also need to read other students' posts and comment on two of them. Your comments should address the content of the student's assignment, showing that you read it and thought about it. You receive 5 points for each comment. See the instructions in Canvas for this assignment.
- 4) **Toy assignment (40 points)**: Identify a good toy and a poor toy to analyze from a child development perspective. In your analysis, you must refer to developmental psychology concepts from the class/book material or material from other reliable developmental psychology sources in an educated fashion. You also need to read other students' posts and comment on two of them. Your comments should address the content of the student's assignment, showing that you read it and thought about it. You receive 5 points for each comment. See the instructions in Canvas.
- 5) <u>Introduction (10 points)</u>: Post your introduction (6 points) in Canvas and respond to two other students (4 points). See the intro module in Canvas.
- Discussions in Canvas (160 points): We will have 4 discussions, one for each module 6) (prenatal & infancy, childhood, adolescence & emerging adulthood, adulthood). In each discussion, you need to post 5 TIMES: you need to make THREE more extensive posts in response to my questions by Wednesday night of the designated week, and then post TWO times in response to other students' posts by the Friday night of that week. Your 3 posts in response to my questions are worth a maximum of 10 POINTS EACH, and your 2 responses to other students are worth a maximum of 5 POINTS each. Thus, you can collect up to 40 points per discussion (40 points x 4 discussions = 160 points total). It is very important that you read the detailed instructions about how to post in the file labeled "Course structure" in the introductory module. When you cite sources in your posts, you need to use APA format in-text citations and an APA format reference list. Not using APA format citations will lead to a reduction of points such that each post that should have accurate citations but does not leads to a reduction of 5 points (see the "Course Structure" document for specific instructions). You can always refer to our textbook in your posts, but for most discussion questions, you need to find outside sources as well (other than the textbook).

Incomplete

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete (I). The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade (usually an F). F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

Final examinations may involve proctored on-campus arranged exams or may be administrated completely online at the discretion of the instructor and in keeping with the stated policies provided in the course syllabus. Please refer to the syllabus at the start of the quarter for additional details and contact the instructor directly for any clarifications. A student who is not in compliance with the scheduled format may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be in compliance with any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter during the standard academic year (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.
