Course Information

This course serves to introduce students to basic concepts, theories, principles and an historical overview of the criminal process as they relate to the formal and informal adjudication of violent, serious, and chronic juvenile offenders. Prerequisite: CJ&101 recommended.

Course Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to:

- Distinguish the important differences between the adult and juvenile justice systems.
- Identify the nine Supreme Court cases which have shaped critical issues in the Juvenile Justice System.
- Identify important milestones in the development of the Juvenile Justice System.
- Identify the basic procedures associated with the adjudication of Juvenile court cases.
- Recognize and understand the problems and issues associated measuring Juvenile Crime and Victimization.
- Identify the important aspects of the Diversion and Intake process of Juvenile Justice.
- Identify and discuss the goals and processes of Juvenile Probation and Parole.

How Outcomes Will be Met

Course outcomes will be met via a variety of academic delivery strategies to include writing assignments, eExercises, discussion forums, quizzes, and a comprehensive final exam.

Attendance

Please read this section very carefully. If you cannot adjust your schedule to the rhythm of the class, you will have difficulty succeeding in this course. All students are expected to attend the online classroom five times a week for an average of 1-2 hours at a time. You do not need to be online at a certain time, but you must complete the work within the given time frame. Obviously, if students do not attend the online classroom regularly, the opportunity to perform well in this course is greatly diminished. Deadlines are firm and the late penalty for this course is strictly enforced regardless of the reason for the late submission in order to ensure fairness for all students. Note, quizzes and discussion forums must be completed during the current academic week only. There are no make-ups on discussion forums or quizzes if you miss them during the current academic week. Both the discussion forums and the quizzes will automatically close at 11:59pm on Sunday nights. For Assignments, the late penalty is -10% per day. The online class environment has a very different rhythm as compared to the traditional live, on-campus course and each online course is different from other online courses. In this class, the first day of the online "week" begins on Monday mornings at 12:01am and runs through Sunday night at 11:59pm. All work must be submitted by the 11:59pm deadline in order to avoid the late penalty. There are six major components to this course: 1) Reading the assigned textbook, 2) Viewing all lecture material (PowerPoint slides which are not narrated), 3) Discussion Forums, 4) Assignments, 5) Quizzes, and finally, 6) A comprehensive Final Exam. Each of the aforementioned items are discussed in further detail below.

Course Requirements

All students are expected to read the required chapters of the textbook as outlined online and in the schedule section of this syllabus. Students are also expected to read the required chapters to attend class regularly, finish online requirements, take notes, ask questions, and participate in discussions.

Make-Up Policy

The late penalty in this course is strictly enforced to ensure fairness to all students. Late work will be accepted in this course at the rate of -10% per day late. In class and group exercises may not be made up given their synchronous form however. The discussion forums will also automatically close at midnight on the last day of the academic week (Sundays) and cannot be made up once they are closed. Note, immediate, proactive communication and notification from the student is imperative in this course.
