Course Information: Description & Outcomes

The course starts off with you—as a global knowledge worker. We will use the classic business article by Peter Drucker which predicted the rise of the knowledge worker to critically analyze Managing Oneself.

Next we put your newly learned Knowledge Worker skills to use as we learn about business and the global value chain. We'll then delve into the PESTLE analysis-- covering global politics, economics, social, technological, legal and environmental issues.

Throughout this course we will work together in groups and critically think about the concepts we cover and the information we share.

It's exciting to embark on this journey together and define a new kind of course that will keep you excited about the possibilities and that will teach you what the world and the future brings.

Outcomes

- Conduct an inventory of strengths, culture heritage, values, belongingness, and contribution and the relationship of the student and a culturally diverse world.
- Critically analyze how political, economic, and socio-cultural forces, using models of
 universalism, to reducing inequity, promoting resilience, empowering those who are left
 out and promoting those who are marginalized.
- Critically evaluate international business practices through the lens of ethical and social responsibility, including with regards to environmental sustainability.
- Communicate effectively both orally and in writing regarding international business issues.
- Think critically and creatively about international business processes.
- Work cooperatively in culturally diverse teams of students to authentically interact and communicate to complete assigned activities.

Global Knowledge Worker Assignment

There is one writing assignment and it is due <u>in class **and** on Canvas</u> and will be subject to Vericite review.

Product Design

In-class groups will be formed and each group will design a product or business venture. This product/business venture will be used throughout the course to apply the concepts we learn in class.

Film Worksheets

This class will be run as a hybrid class, meeting primarily on-campus with a few Friday classes meeting online as identified in the schedule below. Friday online classes will consist of watching a required film and completing a worksheet that will be due in class the following Monday. Every required film can be accessed for free through a link on our Canvas page. The required worksheets are included in your course module.

PESTLE Presentations

Each student will be required to present on two elements of the PESTLE analysis. This selection of the country and element will be determined in class. Presentations are scheduled for the middle of the term and the last week of class. The power point presentation is due on Canvas before the first presentation in class. Presentations are subject to Vericite review. The purpose of these two assignments is for students to learn research, compilation and analysis skills.

PESTLE Peer Reviews

There are two PESTLE peer reviews. Students will partner to assist each other in beginning their individual PESTLE presentations.

Exams

There are two exams as indicated in the Course Schedule below.

News Article Presentation

Each student will be required to present on an assigned news article. The selection of the article and the requirements will be on Canvas, with no in-class submission required.

Class Policies

Keeping Track of Your Work

You are solely responsible for keeping track of your own work. Grades will appear on Canvas and it is your responsibility to check your grades on a regular basis so that you can avoid any

surprises. As mentioned above, *grades are final upon recording and non-negotiable*. The instructor recommends saving all your course work until the term has ended.

Assignment Drafts

The instructor will not read or proofread assignment drafts for the sole purposes of grade feedback. I am happy to give specific feedback as requested or to answer specific questions related to assignments and drafts. You may seek assistance in office hours, by appointment, or via email, as time allows and no later than 48-72 hours before an assignment due date.

Submission Problems

If you cannot submit all or part of an assignment because of an accidental loss, etc., this will not excuse a late or missing assignment. If I don't have it, I can't grade it. Technical problems – including computer-related, printer-related, etc. – do not excuse late submissions. If you are experiencing technical difficulties, you are encouraged to consult the Help Desk or other formal sources dedicated to dealing with such issues.

Late Assignments

Makeups
