Course Information

Welcome to Research Methods! This course is a critical foundation for psychology majors and also extremely valuable for anyone who consumes media reports of research. We will learn to critically evaluate research findings with an emphasis on causality and generalizability. This course covers theories, techniques, and applications of psychological research methodology. Students explore a variety of approaches, ranging from uncontrolled field observation to laboratory experiments. Topics include data analysis, report writing, and factors affecting research results. Prerequisite: PSYC& 100.

Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

 Explain the scientific process and the research methods psychologists and behavioral scientists use in the study of human behavior.

- Apply relevant research and statistical terms, concepts, and principles used in the study of human behavior.
- Evaluate and compare various research methods and designs used to guide and develop research investigations.
- Prioritize and apply ethical principles in the conduct of research.

How Outcomes Will be Met

This course will include the following topics: ways of knowing, generating ideas for research, ethics, measures of central tendency and variability, hypothesis testing, manipulating variables, experimental design, quality of methodological control, non-experimental design (e.g. surveys, observation, case studies), and data analysis & summary. Students will exoplore these topics through daily activities including quizzes, data evaluation, and discussion. They will demonstrate their understanding in exams, written assignments, and presentations. For more specific details please see the course calendar in this syllabus.
