SOC 254 Gender in the Social World

Are you born a "man" or "woman," or does society make us "men" and "women?" Examine the ways in which gender organizes social life and shapes the distribution of power in society. Themes may include media stereotyping, gender roles, sex segregation in the workforce, sexual politics, and the experiences of women and men in families.

What to Expect in This Class:

This is a personally transformational course if we've ever seen one! What does it mean to be a "man" or a "woman?" Is one born a "man" or "woman," or does society make "men" and "women?" This course deeply explores our complex social ideas about masculinity and femininity. You will explore the ways in which gender organizes our lives and shapes the distribution of power and privilege in contemporary society. You will also examine how gender influences our everyday interactions with others and how social institutions depend upon and perpetuate gender differences. This class examines the small gendered things we all do every day as well as gendered institutions (such as the economy and mass media). Students frequently tell us that, after taking this class, they can't look at the world the same way again. You'll learn that social and cultural ideas about gender are embedded in almost everything that we do. You'll reflect on the course material, and you'll apply it to your own life. Come prepared to watch films, participate in engaging online discussions, reflect upon gender in your own life, and dialogue on important topics.

Outcomes:

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Illustrate a sociological understanding of sex and gender.
- Analyze the ways in which societies are fundamentally organized by sex/gender systems.
- Describe how power plays a central role in the social construction of sex/gender.
- Explain how experiences of gender are shaped by class and race.

Online learning: Online classes demand independence, discipline, self-motivation, good writing and reading skills (I will be grading your reading comprehension, analysis, and proper citations where

relevant. However, this is not a reading or writing class, so I won't be able to spend loads of time with each student correcting basic mistakes in grammar, spelling, citation, etc!). It is CRUCIAL that you have basic computer technology competence. You will be primarily interacting with your peers and myself online, through discussion posts, forums, papers, and emails.

You must be competent in CANVAS operation and navigation. In addition, you must be able to commit to:

- 1. Checking the course website almost every day,
- 2. Referring to this syllabus and your course calendar OFTEN to keep up with due dates,
- 3. Keeping up independently with the readings, multimedia clips, and assignments, and
- 4. You absolutely must be confident enough to contact me if you have any questions or concerns. We may or may not meet face to face, and that should be okay with you.

You will turn in your assignments each week. Give yourself enough time to do the readings (at least once, if not twice) so that you can answer the forum questions carefully. Do NOT wait until the last day or two to complete the readings and address the forum questions, which are lengthy!

Exams: There will be two exams, each worth 100 points. They will all be open book exams, each with 20 multiple choice questions (worth 5 points each), and you will have 60 minutes to complete each exam. On the exam dates, I will open the exam for 24 hours, and you must click on the quiz, complete the exam (within 60 minutes), and submit the completed exam to me.

Module Response Essays: You are required to complete two Module Response Essays. These papers will be submitted online. Take these papers very seriously! Instructions can be found under the modules for the appropriate week and are entitled "Module Response Essay." Each paper is worth 100 points.
