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Course Description

Welcome to Lifespan Psychology 200! The purpose of the course is to introduce you to the major concepts, theories and research findings in lifespan development. We'll discuss the roles of heredity and environment in shaping development as well as cross-cultural influences in development. We'll cover prenatal development, and various biological, cognitive, emotional, and social aspects of development during infancy, childhood, adolescence, and early, middle, and late adulthood. **Please read this entire syllabus as it contains a lot of important information regarding the class!** If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me as soon as possible.

Course Outcomes

After completing this class, students should be able to:

- Identify and explain the issues involved in the scientific study of human development across the lifespan, from conception through death, through the interaction of biological, psychological, and social aspects of human development across the lifespan.
- Distinguish between the contributions of influential theorists in developmental psychology, such as Piaget, Ainsworth, Kohlberg, Bronfenbrenner, Vygotsky, Arnett, and Erikson.
- Relate course materials to a personal perspective on human developmental experiences, as well as learn how to test theories using qualitative and quantitative research methods.
- Identify and critically reflect on the variability and diversity of developmental pathways, and their own embeddedness in social, cultural, and political contexts.
- Apply knowledge of cross-cultural research to developmental differences across the life span.

Exams & Activities (380 points total)

- Exams (90 points): There will be 3 exams, each worth 30 points. The exams 1) are not cumulative, and they cover the topics listed in the review sheet for each exam. The exams are taken online in Canvas and include multiplechoice, true/false, matching and short-answer questions. Each exam is available for 5 days (see the schedule for the exam dates). You can take the exam any time during this period. Once you start the exam, you must finish it, and you have 90 minutes to complete the exam. Please note that if you start the exam less than 90 minutes from the deadline (11:59pm on the last exam day), the exam will still automatically close at 11:59pm. No late exams are generally given, but please contact me for exceptional circumstances such as serious illness/death in the family. If possible, do not take the exams with a cell phone. A student who has a legitimate medical situation or other emergency needs to communicate with me promptly and contact me as early as possible before the exam deadline. Please note that the exam answers will be revealed after the deadline. After they are revealed, no late exams are possible.
- 2) <u>Canvas assignments (180 points)</u>: We will have online Canvas assignments in which you'll discuss topics and take surveys related to the class material. For most assignments, you also need to comment on other students' posts. See the instructions for these assignments in Canvas.
- 3) Introduction (10 points): Students need to post an introduction and respond to two other students' introductions in the introductory module in Canvas.
- 4) <u>Mastery Training assignments in Mindtap (100 points)</u>: Complete the Mindtap Mastery Training (to 100%) in each chapter by the due date. You will get 10 points per chapter for the Mastery Training completed in its entirety. We will have 15 chapters (Ch. 1 is optional and not counted for points), and I recommend that you complete the Mastery Training for all of them. However, for maximum flexibility this quarter, you will get points for completing the Mastery training in 10 chapters, and you can miss 5 Mastery trainings without losing any points. If you complete the Mastery Training for more than 10 chapters, you get **5 points extra credit** per chapter.
