Course Description

This is a course on American government and politics. The course is designed to familiarize you with the basic elements of the American system. We will look at how the three branches of government work. We will study their powers and role in American government. We will also discuss federalism, civil rights and civil liberties, the difference between the two and their impact. In addition, we will try and gain an understanding of the media and its role. We will also look at the bureaucracy, interest groups and political parties. We will briefly examine foreign policy especially in the current environment. Lastly, we will apply everything to current events. Thus, making it easier to understand how politics works in the daily context. These are the questions that shall occupy us over the course of the quarter.

Course objectives

By the end of the quarter students should be able to

1. understand the concepts of democracy, the American presidential system and the role and influence of the interest groups
- 2.integrate this knowledge for a personal understanding of how the political process works
- 3.evaluate underlying assumptions presented by other authors
- 4.clearly define and identify the three branches of government
- 5.analyze authors and critically evaluate academic articles
- 6.discuss the role of the media
7. apply this concept to the contemporary world

Requirements

Discussions

We will be discussing topics online. They will be posted in the Discussion folder. Sometimes

I will post a topic and link for discussion and other times I will ask you to post. You will in about 10 lines or more respond to your thoughts on the article and then respond to 2 other student's post. This can be about 5 lines or more. The discussion will always be posted on Monday morning by 7am and due on Sunday night at 11:59 pm. Please be respectful of each other. Some topics may get controversial , you are free to express your opinions but no personal attacks will be tolerated. Our class is a safe environment to express your opinions. You can disagree with another opinion but do it in a respectful manner. In addition you will also do a discussion of each chapter every week. This will also be in the Discussion Folder. You will post 2 questions per chapter and state why you think they are necessary to talk about. You will just like the Current Event discussion respond to 2 students with the same guidelines as above.

Extra Credit

There are extra credit opportunities. Every week the best article (ones you post) that evokes the most discussion will get 2 points of extra credit. The last week will consist of an assignment that will be of extra credit. This will be announced closer to the date.

Every week you will do a Chapter reading and complete the quizzes listed with it in the Assignments in the Task Bar. There will also be a Power Point which I will put every week in the Announcement that goes with the chapter. You will post 2 questions after the readings in the Discussion Folder which I will open for this purpose. This will count towards participation. After every chapter reading you will take a quiz. This will be every week. There are due dates on these Quizzes. The quizzes are open however, please complete them in the week they are due. The quizzes are located in the Task bar which says quizzes or assignments.

Citizenship Quiz

First you will take the citizenship test (50 questions) yourself. This is the website for taking the test. (Copy and paste)

The 2nd part of the assignment will entail taking any 10 citizenship questions from these 50 questions and interview 5 students from your other classes. If you cannot find 5 students you can use your family members. Make sure you write the names of the students that you interviewed. You will discuss your findings with other students on the discussion board. You will post what your questions were and what responses you got from other students. This will be due on the 30th of April by 11:59 pm. Remember you are being graded on completion, online discussion and the interview. So do not worry about getting the questions wrong. Its just an exercise to test your knowledge.

Geography quiz/interview. You will take the quiz yourself. I will list 15 countries and will mark them on this blank map. In addition you will ask 5 students from your other classes to mark the same countries on a map. You will then post online how you and how the students you interviewed fared. . The same guidelines as the citizenship quiz apply. Make sure you write the names of the students you interviewed on the maps. Again this assignment is just for you to see where you stand on your knowledge. You will be graded for completion.

PROCEDURES AND GUIDELINES OF THE SOCIAL SCIENCE DIVISION Spring 2017

Cheating, Stealing and Plagiarizing*

Cheating, stealing and plagiarizing (using the ideas or words of another as one's own without crediting the source) and inappropriate/disruptive classroom behavior are violations of the Student Code of Conduct at Bellevue College. Examples of unacceptable behavior include, but are not limited to: talking out of turn, arriving late or leaving early without a valid reason, allowing cell phones/pagers to ring, and inappropriate behavior toward the instructor or classmates. The instructor can refer any violation of the Student Code of Conduct to the Dean of Student Services for possible probation or suspension from Bellevue College. Specific student rights, responsibilities and appeal procedures are listed in the Student Code of Conduct, available in the office of the Dean of Student Services.

Incomplete

If a student fails to complete all the required work for a course, an instructor may assign the grade of Incomplete. The student must complete the coursework by the end of the next quarter, or receive the assigned letter grade.

F Grade

Students who fail a course will receive a letter grade of "F."

Final Examination Schedule

The Social Science Division will adhere to the final examination schedule as stated in the BC Schedule. Final examinations will be held at the end of each quarter at fixed times. Instructors will not give examinations in advance of the regular schedule. A student who is absent from any examination held at any time during the quarter may forfeit the right to make up the examination. If, for illness or some other circumstance beyond the student's control, the student is unable to be present at any scheduled examination and has contacted the instructor on a timely basis, the student may be permitted to take such examination at a time designated by the instructor.

Withdrawal From Class

College policy states that students must formally withdraw from a class by the end of the seventh week of the quarter (Registration Office, B125). If a student has not withdrawn by that date, an appropriate letter grade will be assigned for the course.

Hardship Withdrawal

Instructors may assign the grade of (hardship withdrawal) at their discretion in the event that a student cannot complete the coursework due to extreme and exceptional circumstances. Students may also contact the Enrollment Services office BEFORE grades

are assigned in cases of hardship.

Students Who Require Disability Accommodations:

Students with disabilities who have accommodation needs are encouraged to meet with the Disability Resource Centre (DRC) office located in B132 (telephone 425.564.2498 or TTY 425.564.4110), to establish their eligibility for accommodation. The DRC office will provide each eligible student with an accommodation letter. Students who require accommodation in class should review the DRC accommodation letter with each instructor during the first week of the quarter.

Students with mobility challenges who may need assistance in case of an emergency situation or evacuation should register with Disability Resource Centre, and review those needs with the instructor as well.

Distribution of Grades

Grades will not be posted in the Social Science Division or in faculty offices, and secretaries will not give out grades. Students should access their grades through the BC Web site.

Return of Papers and Tests

Paper and/or Scantron score sheet returns will be arranged in the following ways ONLY:Â by mail, if student supplies the instructor with stamped, self-addressed envelope (with appropriate postage); or by the instructor designating a time and place whereby the student may retrieve his/her papers. Unclaimed papers and/or Scantron score sheets must be kept by the instructor for a minimum of sixty (60) instructional days following the end of the quarter.

*If you are accused of cheating, stealing exams and/or plagiarism, there is a Bellevue College Student Discipline and Appeals Procedure (the right to due process) which you may pursue. Contact the office of Division Chair (D110), the Dean of Student Services (B231A) or the Associated Student Body (C212) for information regarding the appeals process.
