What are the 2s and 3s up to?

The children were excited to see the snow and had the opportunity to explore the snow outside. They stomped in the snow and they would hear the crunchy sound their feet made and they would stomp some more. The children had fun playing in the snow on the playground and the teacher During the month of December, the teachers provided different art activities for children to explore open ended art activities. The benefits of open-ended art allow children to express themselves through their art which supports their understanding of their own emotions and provides a tool for self-regulation.

It provides opportunities to use language related to their creations and their emotions. They are also developing and refining their fine motor skills as they manipulate materials or use tool. It also encourages the highest levels of creative thinking and stimulate children exploring materials, methods and natural curiosity drives them to engage in problem solving. These early experiences with creative thinking provide many of the skills needed to succeed later in life. We have a hand-out in the Toddler 2 classroom which gives you ideas that can support your child's creativity at home and some suggestions on how to stalk the them about their art work at home.

What is Pre-K 1 up to?

We have been very busy learning in the PreK-1 class, everything from math to science.

We are learning the value of numbers and expressing these numbers in the form of tally marks and working with dominoes. The children were instructed to look at their dominos and then transfer the number dots to paper. From there they decided which side was larger and smaller. We added the two sides, practicing our writing skills and number recognition. Both these activities help your child develop number sense (math abilities) and an understanding of quantities and concepts of *more* and *less*. We practice individually at the table on paper, and we also invite each child to come to the whiteboard and tally out numbers.





projects require two days to complete. We collected milk cartons from our summer picnics and this month we painted them brown to look like gingerbread. The following day everyone embellished their houses as we listened to *The Gingerbread Man*.



Science came directly to our school in the form of SNOW. Talking about the weather and different forms of precipitation was the topic of the day. Conversations included how cold our hands were after playing in the snow.

Be sure to write your child's name on their gloves. Twenty children times 2 gloves mean 40 gloves to sort and return to their proper cubby, Wow that's a lot of math for these teachers!

Here is an experiment for you to do at home if it gets down below freezing. Lay a wet cloth outside and in the morning take a look and see if it is frozen solid and flat like a piece of paper. Your child will be amazed and they will remember it for a lifetime. Even better, try laying a small shirt of pants outside and get ready to laugh with them at the frozen clothes.



Pajama Day was filled with games, art, music and hot chocolate. Everyone had a great time, even though we were all in PJ's no one was tired, fancy that!

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What is Pre-K 2 up to?

The children use name sticks in the classroom to work in centers. This has reduced conflicts regarding who was in the center. The children are able to solve the problem by just looking at the pockets and also advocate for themselves as well as their friends. They remember the routine and this helps them to regulate their emotions and take care of their needs appropriately.

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What is Preschool 3 up to?

In December we spent the month learning all about recycling and compost! We have discussed what kinds of materials and items can be recycled and which ones should be thrown out. When discussing compost we connected our experiences with how we contribute compost at school every day at breakfast and lunch!







We will be wrapping up our recycling unit at the beginning of January and will transition to our next unit 'Signs!' In this unit we will explore all types of signs ranging from signs we see on a daily basis, their meaning, and even sign language!

We encourage you to point out signs with your child to help further teach and connect their experience to the world around them!
